INTRODUCING MR. SPECTATOR

Mr. Spectator comes to us a distinguished figure walking in a mist of dignity and excellence from the essays of a small daily sheet of the eighteenth century.

He is with us today, as in times before he was with the jobbers at Jonathan's and the politicians at St. James' Coffee House.

Slowly, through the ages he walks, retaining the unique demeanor he was endowed with, observant and meditative, an impressive character instilled in lines of immortal literature.

It is from these lines we summon him to join us here and play the role of spectator once again.

To pay homage to his brilliant creators and to enlighten your minds or enhance your memories as to the nature and presence of Mr. Spectator, we trace the following brief history.

He is the literary creation of two men of English letters, Joseph Addison and Richard Steele, who invented him to fulfill their need of an unbiased person into whom they could inject their own individual criticisms and opinions without incurring the displeasure of their readers. In accomplishing this task they gave us the Spectator papers, in which their character had a voice that was to acquire a vast audience, for soon all London was daily reading the observations and meditations made on Mr. Spectator's exploits in society.


To carry on his task, Mr. Spectator was equipped with certain singular traits and varied abilities which we need mention, since they are requisite to the preservation of his original person and in accounting for his presence with us. His early life is of no notable significance, and we shall dispense with it, saying only that at a very early age he was reputed to be sullen and that he showed remarkable aptitude for learning. During his university years he was distinguished by a profound silence, and he tells us that, although being in attendance there eight years, his entire conversation scarce amounted to an hundred words. He applied himself with much diligence to his studies, and upon his graduation had made acquaintance with all the celebrated books of his time in both the learned and the modern tongues. Leaving the university, he sought knowledge in other lands and broadened the scope of his learning. After traveling several years in this manner, he returned to London to assume his role of Spectator.

Probably the most remarkable aspect of his intellectual genius is his versaility, his apparent ability to give a cross section of affairs, circumstances, and conditions of different natures. Being conversant with all the subjects of his day and expertly versed in Latin, he is well fitted for his task, and he employs his perceptions and abilities to best advantage. Outstanding among his characteristics is the strict taciturnity he maintains, talking only when in company of his select friends. His face is well known, for he visits all the places where people congregate and goes to the theatre and coffee house regularly. He travels through life, a looker-on, a spectator, content to observe rather than to participate.

So it is that we invite him to visit us, to play the role of spectator once again; and, who knows, perhaps a dissertation on pork pie hats or costume jewelry will come from his pen. He will, possibly, poke fun at us. While he is with us, we must consider him a worthy guest, be mindful of his peculiar disposition, and do nothing to displease him.

If you see him strolling down our halls in quaint toggery, peeping behind doors, or audaciously listening to your conversation, pay him no heed. He is only a spectre spectator.



Members of this group are Miss Laura Merritt, Spanish; Miss Edna K. Fearl, Latin and Italian; Mr. Ross E. Benchoff, Latin and geometry; Miss Josephine A. Young, French and German; and Miss Agnes B. Neary, German and Latin.

Fundamentals of grammar are not the only points brought out in their classes. French students read "Le Petit Journal," a newspaper written in French. Then, too, they read classics of literature and learn to give public speaking talks in French. Advanced Latin students translate the orations of Cicero and the verse of some of the most famous Roman poets, among them, Virgil. Italian pupils also read works of literature.

Poetry is studied in German classes, among which "Der Erlkonig" by Goethe, proved to be the most popular. Conversations that might take place in any German city are studied. The exploits of "Emil and the Detectives" proved entertaining to both German and Spanish students. These Spanish pupils also made interesting visits to well-known South American citites.

Every student of a foreign language thoroughly enjoys his course.


FINE ARTS


Each boy's program is so arranged at the beginning of the school term in order that he may spend a half-day in the shop of his choice. The other half of the day is spent in English, vocational mathematics, and science classes.

Many of the shops give the boys preliminary training to take their places in industry as apprentices. Among these are the machine shop, wood work shop, plumbing shop. The electric, auto mechanics, commercial art, printing, mechanical drawing, and sheet metal shops teach the boys such techniques that will form a firm foundation for them in their future work.

All the shops give the boys α knowledge of the type of work they must do when they enter the field of industry.







JUNIOR CLASS OFFICERS



TENS TO THE MUSICIANS



BAND

Upon reviewing the musical events of the year, we find that the Johnstown High School Band under the leadership of Mr. Charles J. Aikey was very active.

In keeping with its policy of entertaining Johnstown High School football fans with the latest in intricate drills and stunts, our school's snappy 103-piece band this year added a new feature to its novel drills and stunts by reviving the old art of Swiss flag twirling. James Killius, William Bader, and Hubert Custer were the musicians who specialized in performing in this art. Other stunts for which the band received recognition were its night drills at The Point Stadium with all lights extinguished. Small lights carried by each band

member during the drills made it possible to produce a variety of colorful formations. During the football season, the band members learned approximately forty different drills.

The band won first place in the Police Jubilee Band Contest at The Point Stadium, defeating such bands as Altoona, Greensburg, and Indiana. While the orchestra was rehearsing the music for their winter concert, a pit band was selected from among the band members to provide music for the assemblies.

During the winter months the drill band, augmented by several additional musicians from high school and Joseph Johns, furthered its musical knowledge by rehearsing different types of musical compositions. Some of these compositions were played by the band during its assembly concert. "The Three Bears," "The Wed-





ding of the Rose," "The Royal Escort," "Ciribiribin," "Footlifter,"—these were some of the numbers included on the program. A trombone quartet, composed of James Killius, William Bader, John Dowling, and Glenn Reed, played a number entitled "Two Pairs of Slippers," accompanied by the band.

During the summer of 1939, the Johnstown branch of the American Automobile Association announced that at the Pennsylvania State American Automobile Association Convention, the Johnstown High School Band had been selected to lead the Pennsylvania delegation of the Schoolboy Patrol in their national annual rally at Washington, D. C., in May, 1940. The band immediately began a number of projects to help defray the expenses of the trip. Band members sold sandwiches, apples, and candy bars on the special trains going to New Castle and Clairton football games. The band sponsored the visit of the United States Marine Band to Johnstown, thereby securing a certain percentage of the proceeds. It held skating parties at Westmont Grove on December 27 and February 13; and it sold Johnstown High School Trojan covers, which were sponsored by the Student Council.

Because of its past performances and the pending trip to Washington, the Athletic Department and the School Board rewarded the band by purchasing new uniforms for them. The new uniforms were of the same style as the previous ones, with four minor changes. These changes gave the new uniforms a snappier and more colorful appearance. The new hats were of the same design, but were made of better material. The new plumes were made of feathers, so placed that any slight breeze would ruffle them.

The band was organized very efficiently to prepare for the trip to Washington. A student director, sectional leaders, and librarians

were appointed to help the band function efficiently. Altogether the trip was a very worthwhile experience for every member of the band.

The band has truly had a remarkable year.





ORCHESTRA

The Johnstown High School Orchestra has enjoyed a very successful season. Among its many accomplishments were several joint concerts with other schools. On December 15, 1939, in the Johnstown High School Auditorium, the orchestras of Greensburg, Latrobe, and Johnstown High Schools combined to give the first joint concert. Mr. F. A. Ringrose, director of the Latrobe High School Orchestra, directed the combined orchestras in two numbers. They were Coronation March (from The Prophet) by Meyerbeer, and My Maryland, a selection by Romberg. The soloists from Latrobe High School were Marie Harmon and Howard Weiss. Miss Harmon played a piano solo entitled Rondo in E Flat by Hummell. Mr. Weiss played a violin solo entitled The Sun of the Puszta by Keler-Bela. Mr. Gordon Williams, director of the Greensburg High School Orchestra, led the orchestras in two pieces. They were In A Monastery Garden by Ketelby, and Two Guitars by Horlick. The soloists from Greensburg High School were Robert Straitiff and Secondine D'Angelo. Mr. Straitiff played a saxophone solo entitled The Dutchess by Rehl. Miss D'Angelo played an oboe solo entitled Lamento (Nocturne) by Bassi. All of the soloists were well received, and several of them returned to play encores.

Mr. C. P. Huntington, director of the Johnstown High School Orchestra, opened the program by directing the combined orchestras in the playing of On the Campus by Goldman. Mr. Huntington later returned and wielded the baton in two numbers. Adoration by Barowski, and Boccaccio Overture by Von Suppe. These numbers closed the program.

On January 26, 1940, the Johnstown High School Orchestra traveled to Latrobe where it combined with the Latrobe High School Orchestra and the Greensburg High School Orchestra to give their second joint concert. Mr. F. A. Ringrose, director of the Latrobe High School Orchestra, opened the program. Mr. Gordon Williams, director of the Greensburg Orchestra, Mr. C. P. Huntington, director of the Johnstown Orchestra, and Mr. F. A. Ringrose each led the combined orchestras in two selections. Soloists for the Johnstown High School Orchestra were William Bader, who played a trombone solo, and Frank Opperman, who played a cornet solo.

In the meantime, the orchestra presented an assembly program concert, during which



they played several of the pieces that were to be heard on the combined concert programs. Frank Opperman, William Bader, and Elvira Cavallo, who played an accordion solo and several popular numbers, were the soloists for this concert.

The Johnstown Orchestra was well represented at the All-Western High School Orchestra Festival at Meyersdale, and at the All-State High School Orchestra at Berwyn. There were seventeen Johnstown High School musicians at Meyersdale, many of them winning first chairs in their respective sections. The two musicians who went to the All-State meeting were James Demos, who played the viola, and Frank Opperman, who had the honor of occupying first chair in the cornet section.

Because of the Piper's action, the people are repentant, and the little lame boy implores the Pied Piper to bring back his friends. Of course, the children return, and the Mayor then voices the theme, or call it moral if you will, in his line:

"A promise is a fragile thing; It may be wise to never make one,

But wiser still to never break one!"

George Bigelow, Henry's bitter enemy, causes Henry quite a bit of trouble, only to have the roles reversed at the end of the play.

But "What a Life" is a farce with a purpose. It demonstrates the futility of attempting to make Phi Beta Kappa material out of an irresponsible lad, the obtuseness of parents, and the importance of being self-confident.

"Though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor and though I give my body to be burned and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing."




ART STAFF






AVIATION CLUB



Although not school clubs, they enjoy full support and are sanctioned by the administration because of the high standards and principles they recognize.



JUNIOR ACADEMY OF SCIENCE







THE ASTRONOMY CLUB



ELECTRIC SHOP

Facilities for vocational studies in J. H. S. have a wide disparity. Boys preparing for work in the practical electricity field find an adequate course of instruction in Mr. Marks' electrical shop. Here the students are taught how to read electrical instruments, the fundamentals of housewiring, armature rewinding, and the operation of motors and other electrical apparatus.

Many of the boys gain practical experience by working on small jobs outside the school, and by operating the various electrical devices in the school. This includes the running of the motion picture projector, providing school dances with novelty illumination, and the management of the stage lights, and public address system.

The Chamber of Commerce lauded this shop's construction of large electric stars used in the city's Christmas decoration and lighting system. These stars were suspended across the streets in the business districts and from lamp-posts of other streets.

This year, several of the active boys organized "The High Voltage" club, which has proved very successful. Elected officers of the club are as follows: Harry Dalton, president; William Neil, vice-president; William Weimann, treasurer; and Paul Yacynich, secretary. Seniors were given pins, and juniors, emblems to designate their membership in the organization.

It is expected that the student, upon completion of the course, will enter some phase of the electrician's trade, and in order to facilitate furnishing records asked for by employers, Mr. Marks has kept a complete and accurate file of each student's photograph, his attitude, attendance, and shop grades.

MECHANICAL DRAWING

The vocational mechanical drawing course taught at Johnstown High School covers practically all phases of drawing, such as mechanical, structural, topographical or map making, and architectural drawings. Since the quality of such drawings depends partially upon the legibility of the lettering, the foremost lessons are learning of correct and precise printing.

The first problems in drawing to be presented to the pupils are simple geometric solutions, the purpose of which is to develop speed and accuracy in solving the problems as well as to increase skill and dexterity in handling the drawing instruments.

The pupil next advances to the working drawings. The extent of this type of work ranges from simple orthographic projections to the more complex assembly, development,

and intersection drawings. The course includes sufficient information about all types of designing to assure the student a complete and well-rounded course in the art of mechanical drawing.

As in any other vocation, skill and craftsmanship in a man's work are assets, and the main object of the vocational mechanical drawing classes is to provide a firm foundation upon which the draftsman can build skill and accuracy in his chosen vocation. The number of high school graduates in the drafting rooms of local industries is a testimonial to the fine groundwork and training the student receives while in Johnstown High School. PLUMBING SHOP

The course of instruction offered by the plumbing shop provides two years of elementary training which prepares the student to accept an apprenticeship in this trade. Several graduates of this shop are now Master plumbers, and others are employed throughout the city in apprentice and journeymen capacities. Two others are taking advanced courses from Dr. J. Ernest Wagner, to become plumbing shop teachers.

In the junior year, various forms of soldering are practiced, and lectures are given on the theory of the trade. Soldering is fol-

lowed by instruction in circulation principles and drawing demonstrations of different installations of domestic hot water supplies, range boilers, and water fronts and backs.

The principles and actual practice of joint wiping are begun in the junior year and continued in the senior year. The threading of galvanized pipe, a study of the Plumbing Code and the actual installation of boilers, heaters, sinks, and bathroom fixtures are also a part of the senior year's work. All water, waste, and vent lines are installed according to the city's plumbing laws.

Drawings showing the complete plumbing of different sized buildings are made and arranged to correspond with the blue print principle of installation.

Seniors are permitted, when grades are satisfactory, to make a treasure chest for themselves. This chest is covered with sheet lead carved by hand in the form of two dragons. It requires two months' work for its completion, as no part of the regular course is dispensed with and all school work must meet a schedule.

Students finishing the prescribed course are each presented a gold faucet by their instructor.



MACHINE SHOP

The machine shop offers practical instruction to pupils who wish to enter local industries upon their graduation from high school. These pupils work for two years in a modern, completely equipped shop, where they acquire a sound knowledge of their trade, including use of machines and tools.


Students must first learn the names of all the tools, their use, their operation, and their care. They are then assigned to the various machines in turn so that they may learn to do the particular work of each machine.

This shop is often called upon to provide parts and fittings for use in some of the other vocational shops. Lathe centers are made for the wood shop, bushings for motors in the electric shop, set screws and handles for the print shop, and steel rollers or groovers for the sheet metal shop. Materials are often supplied to the janitors for repair work around the building. The boys also replace or repair broken parts of the machines with which they work.

As projects inside the school are not enough to keep the boys busy, they are encouraged to bring in projects of their own. Work is also supplied by some of the local industrial plants.

This year an exhibit of parts and tools made and used in the machine shop was prepared and mounted on a display board by the students. It was first shown in the main hall of the school and later in the window of a local store, in order to acquaint the public with the skills acquired by boys taking this course.












GRAPHIC ARTS

Take a blank sheet of paper. Compare it with a bit of printed matter, such as a play program. Can you visualize what is needed to transform the blank into the artistic program before you? If you can, then you can realize what the Print Shop is and what it can do.

Mix together printing presses, type, ink, and paper; add the J. H. S. Printing Class with wise guidance; and out of a blank page is created a work of art—just as the artist paints a masterpiece, using the tools of his art; just as the author uses the alphabet to create great literature.

Thirty-five members of this group are also members of the National Student Graphic Arts Society. This club won First Award on senior high school level in the National Scrapbook Contest sponsored by the National Graphic Arts Education Guild. The award was announced at the Printing Teachers' Conference at Columbia University last June.

Memorable activities of the group this year were a banquet, an exhibit during National Printing Week of pupils' work, and a trip through the plant of The Tribune Publishing Company.




COMMERCIAL ART

The course in commercial art was inaugurated this year as a vocational study in Johnstown High School. Together with the sheet metal shop, it is housed in the Adams Street school building. This addition to the offering of courses has opened a new field to vocational students in our school.

At the beginning of the year the boys in these classes were first required to learn to letter the different types of alphabets. Practice in this work was provided by the making of signs for football and basketball games. These signs were first drawn in pencil, then inked, and finally painted. Another phase of the work was learning the use of paints and the mixing of colors for the reproduction of pictures from magazines or books. When a student had selected the type of job he liked, he first scaled it on paper by means of blocks. It was then transferred to poster board and painted or done in ink to resemble the original from which it was drawn.

Various devices for saving time were studied. One of these is a process known as pouncing, where the layout is perforated so that it can be used many times. Silk screen work is the process of putting the design on silk stretched on a frame and forcing the paint through the screen.










WOOD WORK SHOP

The wood work shop is well equipped for preparing boys to enter an important field of industry. The students in this course study the practical principles of carpentry and general construction work.

The practical work in the shop centers about cabinet making, lathe turning, furniture repairs, and furniture building. The boys assist with much of the repair work around the school, particularly on broken desks, tables, or other furniture.

Before a pupil begins actual construction of a piece of work, he must submit a rough unfinished sketch of his plan. This is then corrected and finally approved by the instructor. In this manner the boy learns to work from sketches, scale drawings, and blueprints.

Another phase of the training in this course deals with estimates. Students are required to figure out the amounts of materials and costs of various construction projects in order to determine their ability to economize and to give accurate specifications on a particular job. When the student has cultivated this ability, he has possession of the primary principle of successful structural engineering.



AUTO MECHANICS

The course in automobile mechanics is very popular because of the practical training it offers in the care and repair of cars.

When the juniors first enter this course, they learn theory through notebook work. Later they are assigned to do repair work with the seniors. The boys usually make such repairs on their own cars. In this way they learn to be careful and take a greater interest in their jobs.

This shop, located at Cochran Junior High School, is well equipped for any work from the simplest job of changing a tire to the most difficult kind of engine repair. Graduates of this course may become automobile salesmen or service station attendants; or they may enter such fields as those of battery service and other electrical work, general repairs, or body work. Body and fender repairs require both acetylene and electric welding as well as wood work and upholstery mending.


Because of the training they receive along these lines, students of outstanding ability are recommended for placement in local garages and service stations each year.
















SHEET METAL SHOP

One of the new courses organized this year and housed in the Adams Street building is the Sheet Medal Shop. This course aims to give pre-apprentice training to boys who wish to enter the trade. The first step in the work includes sketching the articles to be made, with exact dimensions. Then the boys work from their own drawings in the fabrication of small articles. Another important step is learning the process of soldering. The more advanced work includes learning the uses of the dozen or more different kinds of machines and the various hand tools with which the shop is equipped. The metals used are chiefly galvanized iron, stove pipe iron, and IX and IC tin. Such articles as scrub pails, garbage cans, waste baskets, rain spouting, and flower boxes are some of the products made in the shop.

Outstanding as a project this year was the making, from a material called celloglass, of the large stars used in this city as part of the Christmas decorations. An individual project is being worked out by two boys who are building a miniature hot-air heating furnace.

The picture includes both morning and afternoon groups, with Mr. Bruce Alter as instructor.





The Johnstown High School Trojans' football team had a successful season this year by winning ten out of twelve games. Under the direction of Harold Weigle, head coach, Ralph Weigle, Clarke Shaffer, and Ellsworth Kunkle, assistant coaches, Johnstown played the longest and toughest schedule any Johnstown team ever played.

The Trojans returned to playing night football this year, having played Somerset, Hurst, Glassport, and Clairton at night. The team scored 230 points to 57 for its opponents.

THE 1939 FOOTBALL SEASON





After this, Johnstown scored several touchdowns; Longacre made three; Wos, Mondick, and Gates each made one touchdown. Rizza kicked four extra points, Ream one.

On the following Friday night, Johnstown defeated Hurst, the Class A champions, in a hard fought game, 32 to 6. The Johnstown touchdowns resulted from marches of 71, 60, 70, and 46 yards. Bob Longacre made the feature run of 62 yards for a touchdown. He also scored three other touchdowns on shorter runs. Chupko pushed the other score over from the one-yard line. The extra points were kicked by Rizza.

A surprising Scottdale team held the Trojans to a deadlock during the first half. However, Johnstown came back and scored five touchdowns in the second half to win, 33 to 0. After the second half began, Rizza scored in a lateral pass from Chupko. Longacre also threw a pass to Potthoff for a touchdown and Chupko threw a 40-yard pass to Price for a score. Ream scored in a lateral pass from Longacre and Schellhammer, in a blocked punt. Rizza kicked two extra points and Dunmire made the other. The Trojans made fifteen first downs against two for the losers.

The Trojans were again held to a scoreless tie during the first half by a strong Braddock team. Because of the poor showing of the first team, the Johnstown second team took up the battle in the second half and scored a touchdown. They also set up the second touchdown before the regulars returned. The first touchdown was scored on a pass from




Potthoff to Maser. Longacre took a lateral pass from Chupko to score and Panagotocas scored the last touchdown on a pass. Rizza kicked the extra point. This was the Trojans' first W. P. I. A. L. victory.

On the following Friday night Johnstown defeated the hitherto undefeated Glassport team in one of the toughest games of the year, 14 to 0. Both of the Trojans' touchdowns came as a result of long gains. The first score came when Chupko threw a forty-yard pass to Price. Late in the second period Longacre broke off tackle and ran 62 yards to score. This was one of the best runs of the season since he had no interference past the scrimmage line. Ream kicked the extra points.

At Taggart Stadium, Johnstown came from behind to beat her bitter rival, New Castle, 12 to 7. After recovering a Johnstown fumble on the kickoff, New Castle scored a touchdown within three minutes. However, the fighting Trojans took the kickoff and marched seventy yards for their first touchdown. The Trojans smashed the New Castle line for most of the yardage but scored on a pass to Longacre from Chupko. Going into the







last quarter the Trojans were behind by one point. However, a New Castle fumble was recovered on their own five yard line and Longacre plunged over for the deciding score. Johnstown registered thirteen first downs against four for the losers. The Trojans were strong defensively since New Castle's net gain was only thirty-five yards.

In the most thrilling game of the year, the fighting Trojans came from behind in the last minute to defeat Clairton 7 to 6 at Clairton. Clairton had scored their touchdown in the third period but Subich blocked the try for extra point. With the ball on their own 10-yard line and eight minutes to go, Johnstown started their big drive. It took the Trojans seven minutes to drive down to Clairton's nine-yard line by a series of line plays. With fifty seconds left, Longacre took a lateral pass from Chupko and scored from the nine-yard line. Then Rizza was rushed into the game and he kicked the deciding point. Three plays later the game ended and the Trojans had won their seventh straight victory.

In a rain, snow, and wind storm, the Trojans defeated the hitherto undefeated Fifth Avenue High team of Pittsburgh, 46 to 0. After the first team scored two touchdowns, the reserves played the rest of the game. The touchdowns were scored by Petry, Ream, Makar, Gates, Schellhammer, Rosko, and Wos. Mondick, Potthoff, and Makar made the extra points.

The fighting Altoona High team defeated Johnstown by 7 to 0. Although the Trojans were out-played, out-charged, and out-smarted, they had a number of scoring chances ruined by




fumbles. Cadle from Altoona scored on a nine-yard end run. This defeat eliminated the Trojans from the W. P. I. A. L. championship.


Tre Trojans gained their outstanding victory of the year by defeating with a score of 14 to 6 Weir High of Weirton, West Virginia, who had won twenty-seven consecutive games. Longacre returned the opening kickoff 90 yards for a touchdown. Petry raced around right end from the 13-yard line for the second touchdown. Rizza kicked both extra points. Because of Longacre's great punting, Weirton was kept deep in their own territory, since he kicked five punts out of bounds within Weirton's eight-yard line.

At Jeannette the following Saturday Johnstown was defeated, 19 to 0 by the undefeated Jeannette High team, which won the W. P. I. A. L. championship. The Trojans were outplayed and never threatened Jeannette. Peach was the outstanding man for the winners.

The Trojans ended their football season on Thanksgiving Day with a 6 to 0 victory over Erie Academy. Although Johnstown threatened to score many times, they took advantage of only one opportunity. After marching forty yards, Makar hit the line for the touchdown. The Trojans made fifteen first downs against five for the losers.

In order that the Junior High boys might become acquainted with the football system before they get to Senior High, the "B" team was organized. Under the direction of Coach Clark Shaffer, the team composed of tenth grade boys played a schedule of high school teams. They opened the season with a 7 to 0 victory over Franklin. Then Beaverdale High School tied them 6 to 6. The "B" team then suffered two defeats by Boswell 13 to 6 and by Confluence 20 to 6. The "B" team came back and defeated Carrolltown 18 to 6 and then ended the season by defeating the Junior High All-Stars 18 to 0.





Johnstown High School is proud in having Bob Longacre chosen the winner of the annual Point Stadium award





















MANAGERS

THE JOHNSTOWN HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL TEAM

The Johnstown High School Trojans completed their basketball schedule with twelve wins and five losses. They also lost one game in the District Six eliminations. This year Johnstown withdrew from Section IX of the W. P. I. A. L., which they won last year, and played an independent schedule. In order to participate in the District Six eliminations, the Trojans had to win fifty-seven per cent of their District Six games and could not lose twice to the same team. Portage, Cresson, Conemaugh, Ferndale, Nanty-Glo, Westmont, and Altoona were Johnstown's District Six games.


In opening the season Johnstown defeated Somerset 30 to 15. After being held to a 5 to 4 score in the first half, the Trojans went on a scoring spree. Portage came through and handed Johnstown their first setback, 24 to 21, although the Trojans had a lead of 8 to 2. The Trojans came back into the victory column by defeating Cresson 34 to 27 on a second half spurt. In their best form of the year, the Trojans walloped Conemaugh 43 to 28. Johnstown pulled away in a last quarter rally. The Trojans journeyed to Sharon and were defeated by the unusual shooting Sharon team 40 to 20. The Big Blue came back and beat her rival, Ferndale 34 to 27. After the Trojans had taken a 10 to 2 lead at the end of the first quarter, Nanty-Glo came back to lead at the half 14 to 12. However, Johnstown began to hit and won 29 to 18. In preparation for the Altoona game Johnstown easily defeated Westmont 39 to 20. At Altoona the Trojans defeated the Mountain Lions 32 to 20. Johnstown was never headed after taking the lead in the first quarter 10 to 1. At the half the score was

13 to 11 and 26 to 16 at the third quarter. This victory ended the first half of the Trojans' schedule.

The Trojans avenged their earlier loss to Portage by defeating them 45 to 21. After a slow start, Johnstown defeated them easily. At Ferndale after gaining an eight point lead in the third quarter, Johnstown dropped a thriller, 24 to 22. The poor ball handling and shooting lost the game for the Trojans. Johnstown was handed this second straight defeat when Conemaugh beat them 43 to 27. The Trojans kept on even terms with them during the first half but faltered during the last half. Coach Shaffer's quintet then defeated Westmont for the second time 37 to 27. At Cresson in one of the lowest scoring games of the year, the Trojans deefated Cresson 14 to 12. After being behind 9 to 6 at the half, the Johnnies outscored Cresson in the second half to win. The Trojans were then handed their second defeat by Sharon 49 to 35. In the highest scoring game of the year, the Trojans walloped Nanty-Glo 52 to 15. Before a capacity crowd at High School the Trojans defeated Altoona for the second time this year 18 to 17. This was the first time in five years that Johnstown had defeated Altoona in both games. The Trojans also eliminated them from the district playoffs. It was a nip-and-tuck battle throughout the whole game with Johnstown holding the one point lead for the last two minutes of the game. This closed the regular schedule and Johnstown entered in the playoffs.

In the first elimination game Johnstown and Conemaugh tangled. After leading up till the last three minutes of the game, Johnstown faltered and lost 28 to 24. Conemaugh went on to win the District Six crown and to be runner-up in the state finals.






THE GOLF TEAM



OCTOBER 26—The day of reckoning has finally come! Report cards were given out for the first time this term at the end of the sixth period today.


OCTOBER 28—That was an easy one for the boys, walloping Fifth Avenue High School from Pittsburgh, 46-0.




