## HISTORIC AMERICAN BUILDINGS SURVEY

### CLINTON HOTEL

HABS No. PA-5915

Location: 100 Clinton Street, Johnstown, Cambria County, Pa.

Description: The Clinton Hotel is a four-story, three-bay brick corner building. The elaborate iron cornice with a pediment detail has the letter "C" in the center of the pediment. The first floor has been converted into a streamline moderne-style bar with glass bricks and neon signage.

History: The date stone on the building reads 1890. Throughout its history the building has always been either a hotel or apartments, with a saloon on the ground floor. Over the years laborers, superintendents, bartenders, and seamstresses have lived in the building; in 1959 every tenant in the building was a pensioner. Because of its proximity to the Gautier works, this hotel, along with the others around the corner, has always enjoyed a somewhat dubious reputation.

Project Information and Sources: This report was part of a larger project to document the city of Johnstown, Pennsylvania. The project was undertaken by the Historic American Buildings Survey/Historic American Engineering Record (HABS/HAER), Robert Kapsch, chief, at the request of America's Industrial Heritage Project (AIHP). An overview of history of the city (HABS No. PA-5669) and the downtown (HABS No. PA-5670) provide context for these buildings as well as a comprehensive list of sources.
