## Fifth Avenue Hotel (George Blimmel Building)

Location: 502-04 Broad Street, Cambria City, Johnstown, Cambria County, Pa.

<u>Description</u>: No. 502-04 Broad Street is a multi-family and retail building facing southeast on a corner lot, with a single-family building to one side. The structure is irregularly-shaped, roughly 42' x 76', wood-framed, covered with asbestos shingles. The mansard roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The building is three stories tall. The foundation is constructed of concrete and cut stone. There are a number of dormers on the third floor.

<u>History</u>: No. 502-04 Broad Street was constructed between 1881 and 1889. Blimmel purchased the lot from Margaret P. McConaughy for \$400 in 1881. This building may have survived the 1889 Johnstown flood. In both pre-flood and post-flood city directories for 1889, the building is noted as a saloon, operated by Mary Burkhardt (or Burkhard).

George Blimmel (also spelled "Blemmel") lived in Cambria City as early as 1863. Blimmel was born in Germany, worked as a miner and earned \$30 in 1863. Blimmel was employed by the Cambria Iron Company in an unspecified position and lived at Broad Street and Fourth Avenue, according to an 1876 city directory.

In 1891, the building was known as the "Fifth Avenue Hotel," operated by the Blimmel family. Blimmel's son, John C. Blimmel, a bartender, purchased the structure in 1897 and continued operation of the hotel through at least 1901. Mary Blimmel, a widow, John C. Blimmel, his wife Rose, their five children, and three boarders resided at 504 Broad in 1900. The 1910 census recorded two families boarding in 504 Broad. The structure has been owned since 1922 by the Mikesic family, who continued to operate the Fifth Avenue Hotel through 1949.

With more than three decades of German ownership, and with possible pre-1889 construction, this building represents both the German heritage of Cambria City and the pre-flood neighborhood architecture.
