THOMAS E. REYNOLDS HOUSE

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Location: 728 Bucknell Avenue, Westmont, Johnstown, Cambria County, Pa.

Description: Large and spacious single-family house surrounded by an expansive lawn. Two-and-a-half stories, wood frame with wood shingles. Large hip-roofed front porch, wooden bracket detailing. Bevelled leaded glass transom and sidelights in front entry. The house's location at the edge of Stackhouse Park, a vast wooded area, contributes to a sense of privacy.

History: Built by Johnstown architect Walter Myton for Thomas E. Reynolds in 1907. The property was acquired from the Cambria Iron Co. by Thomas E. Reynolds on February 13, 1907 for \$1,400. In 1907, the city directory listed Reynolds, the treasurer of the firm of Woolf & Reynolds, at the corner of Erie and Second St. (now Bucknell), in Westmont. The 1909-10 directory also lists Lena, Walter, and Gladys, a student, at the same address. The house stayed in the Reynolds family until 1945.
