Location: 248-50 Iron Street, Minersville, Johnstown, Cambria County, Pa.

<u>Description</u>: No. 248-50 Iron Street is a large double house. Each unit is rectangular, 12' x 42', wood-framed with a covering of wood. The roof is a front gable covered with asphalt shingles. The building is three stories tall. There is a common outside front porch, 12' x 6'. The foundation is constructed of cut stone.

This building is very similar in style to a number of buildings on the north side of the 100 and 200 blocks of Iron Street. This home and the other houses were once company housing built by the Cambria Iron Company.

History: No. 248-50 Iron Street was constructed in 1889 by the Cambria Iron Company, which conveyed the property to John Martinek (also spelled "Martinek"), a laborer, for \$1,500 on December 10, 1914. Maritnek was not recorded in either the 1900 or 1910 census for West Taylor Township. He probably came to Johnstown in ca. 1911. A 1915 city directory records Maritinek and his wife Catherine at this residence. The Martinek and Zahurak families have retained ownership since 1914.
