ELMER E. STIMMEL HOUSE

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Location: 434 Luzerne Street, Westmont, Johnstown, Cambria County, Pa.

Description: Large and spacious "Early Modern" single-family home. Two-and-a-half stories, hip roof with large dormer and wide roof overhang. Brick construction and exterior. Large hip-roofed front porch. Decorative geometric brickwork in contrasting color. Bay window on second floor. Leaded glass front door and sidelights executed in geometric design.

History: The house, designed by Johnstown architect Walter Myton, was built sometime between 1908 and 1913 for E. E. Stimmel. Elmer E. Stimmel purchased the property for \$2,100 from Cambria Iron Co. on October 21, 1908. The house, which appears on the 1913 Sanborn map of Westmont, stayed in the Stimmel family for several decades.
