Location: 444 Wayne Street, Westmont, Johnstown, Cambria County, Pa.

Description: Large two-and-a-half-story house. Gambrel roof. First floor has stone exterior with wood shingles on second-floor facade. Zinc came glass diamond-patterned lattice in upper sash of windows. Originally designed with a complete wood shingle exterior, the house was built with a stone first floor.

History: Designed by architect Henry Rogers, this house was built for William C. Krieger, a cashier, in 1913 at a cost of \$6,000. Krieger acquired the property in 1913 from the Cambria Iron Co. for \$3,500.
