HISTORIC AMERICAN BUILDINGS SURVEY

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Location: 210 Chestnut Street, Cambria City, Johnstown, Cambria County, Pa.

Description: No. 210 Chestnut Street is a clubhouse facing south, between single- and multi-family buildings. The clubhouse is an irregularly-shaped building, roughly 41' x 64', with a 26' x 24' addition to the front of the building. The structure is wood-framed, with a brick facade and a side-gable roof of asphalt shingles. The parapeted addition at the front of the building was added between 1911 and 1913. The building was damaged by fire in 1975 and the interior was extensively renovated in 1979.

History: The Mannechor Singing Society Hall was constructed in ca. 1899. German workers of the Cambria Iron Company formed the Cambria City Mannechor (German for "male chorus") in 1868. The first Mannechor Hall was destroyed in the 1889 Johnstown Flood. In 1895, The Society, meeting next in a building at the corner of Second Avenue and Power Street, gathered every Sunday afternoon under the leadership of George Loraditch, president, and Romanus Abele, secretary, according to a city directory.

The Society used this hall until about 1923, when it was sold to private individuals. A Polish singing group, Poliskiej Miadziezy Kolko (KMP Singing Society Choir # 117, founded 1911 at St. Casimir's Polish Catholic Church), utilized the building between 1926 and 1978.
