Cafeteria Guidelines

The cafeterias of Ferndale Area School District serve breakfast and lunch daily. All meals comply with the USDA Meal Pattern requirements. The requirements specify that a student take three of the five components for the district to be reimbursed for all or part of the meal served. The five components are milk, meat/meat alternate, vegetable, fruit and bread/grains.

At the junior/senior high school, extra or ala carte food may be purchased in addition to the full meal. Bottled water and a selection of iced teas are also sold in the cafeteria.

The cafeterias use a debit meal counting system that allows parents to pay in advance for meals and extras. If your child has a medical condition that requires special food, please contact the school so that you can receive the proper form for your physician to sign.

Applications for free and reduced meals will be distributed on the first day of school. Please fill out and return the forms as soon as possible.



District Adopts 2007-08 Budget

The Ferndale Area School Board adopted the 2007-08 fiscal year budget on June 13, 2007. Real estate millage was set at 55.75 mills, which was an increase of 2.75 mills. After review, the Pennsylvania Department of Education approved the tax rate. The increase was less than the 2007-08 index of 5.2% which was required by Act 1 participating districts.

Ferndale Area School District Receives AYP Recognition

The Pennsylvania Department of Education honored both Ferndale Area Elementary School and Ferndale Area Junior/Senior High School with a Keystone Achievement Award for making Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) under the federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) for two consecutive years. In fact, both schools have made AYP for the last three years!

“Educators, school officials, students and parents have worked hard and worked together to achieve at this

Schools earn Keystone Achievement Awards when their students have met targets for performance and

To meet AYP in the 2004-2005 and 2005-2006 school years for performance, and receive a Keystone Achievement Award, schools must have met proficiency targets of at least 45 percent of the students scoring proficient or advanced in math and 54 percent scoring proficient or advanced in reading.

Ferndale Area School District is receiving its third Keystone Achievement Award. Since inception, the Pennsylvania Department of Education has given Keystone Achievement Awards to 2,491 schools.

Challenge Program

On June 1, 2007, five tenth grade students were selected to attend the Challenge Program's Student Networking Program. **Rachel Dorchak, Katie McMullen, Breanne Miller, Lindsey Thomas, and Cayla Zahoran** joined other Challenge Program members throughout the county at the Showcase for Commerce event, held in downtown Johnstown.

The students began their day by having a photograph taken with Congressman John Murtha and Dan Perkins, Challenge Program founder, on the steps of the Frank Pasquerilla Conference Center. The students then moved across the street to the War Memorial where they began touring the Showcase. The students learned about the many business opportunities offered here in Johnstown. They were also able to observe demonstrations of the latest technology being used in business and industry.

Following the morning tour of the Showcase, the students walked to the Holiday Inn to participate in a luncheon. During the luncheon, student leaders acknowledged the participating business sponsors and presented their business ambassadors with a thank you gift.

Highmark Healthy High 5 Grant

Ferndale Area Elementary School has been awarded a Highmark Healthy High 5 School Challenge grant of \$3,000 to implement an outdoor exercise station program aimed at addressing the growing issue of childhood obesity. In the United States, 30 percent of children ages 6-19 are overweight and 15 percent of those children are obese.

Ferndale Area Elementary School will be using the grant to create a walking trail around the playground, complete with a variety of stopping points designed to promote individual physical activities. The program is expected to reach 486 in grades K4-6.

The Department of Health has indicated that childhood obesity is a growing concern in schools as it continues to be one of the nation's top health threats. This grant will provide us with the resources to implement programs to help our children adopt healthier habits.

The Highmark Foundation, through the Highmark Healthy High 5 School Challenge, awarded in June 2007 a total of over \$800,000 in grants to 172 schools within the 49 counties it serves for programs that improve nutrition education, nutrition choices or improve opportunities for physical activity.

National Honor Society

Seven students from Ferndale Area High School were inducted into the National Honor Society during a ceremony held in the school auditorium on May 2, 2007 at 6:00 in the evening. Ms. Lynne Hood was the guest speaker at the ceremony.

Members were chosen by a Selection Committee after fulfilling four criteria: Scholarship, Leadership, Service and Character. Excellent standing in these four categories is required for election into the National Honor Society.

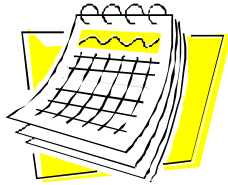

Federal and State Grant Programs

The Ferndale Area School District participates in several state and federally funded grant programs to enhance our educational programs.

Consistent with most other school entities in Pennsylvania, federal monies generally represent the smallest portion of revenue for the Ferndale Area School District. In order to be eligible for grant funds, the district must complete the various applications each year and adhere to numerous mandates imposed with the grants. Historically, the amount of revenue has fluctuated over the years. A review of our federal and state entitlement grant programs follows. 2007-08 amounts are projected amounts, dependent upon passage of the governor's budget.

Title I monies in the amount of \$227,672, an increase of \$15,331 for the 2007-08 project year, are used to improve the educational environment of the entire elementary school. The schoolwide Title I program uses the money to support the salaries and benefits of a Reading Specialist and a Federal Programs Coordinator/Math Specialist. Title I funds are also used for instructional supplies, pupil personnel services, staff, and community support services.

Title IIA, also known as Improving Teacher Quality, is the classroom size reduction initiative. The grant amount of \$44,938 pays the salary and benefits of one teacher. It also funds professional development for district administrators, teachers and paraprofessionals. This grant program has level funding for the 2007-08 project year.

Title V, Innovative Education funds, are used to supplement the Title I schoolwide program at the elementary school. The allocation of \$721 represents a 33% cut in funding for the 2007-08 project year.

The **Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities** grant amounts to \$4,510. This money is used primarily for the Student Assistance Program and health education, with the focus being the prevention of drug and alcohol use and abuse by students. This grant program shows a \$104 increase funding for the 2007-08 project year.

This is the fourth year of the **Accountability Block Grant** in the amount of \$136,982. The funds are used for salaries and benefits of two teachers and two paraprofessionals in the four-year-old kindergarten program. It also funds the after school tutoring program at the elementary school, as well as instructional supplies, staff support and community services.

Project 720 grant of \$77,000 is used to transform academic programs by providing all students in grades 9 through 12 with a rigorous high school curriculum in a small learning environment. Activities under this grant develop the college and career readiness of students.

Artist in Residence

Our Artist in Residence this year was Jim McDowell. Jim is a local and popular artist that lives nearby, in the Moxham section of Johnstown. Jim is a sculptor, potter and musician. Jim worked with the high school art students using clay. The students made hand-built African Face Jugs and wheel-thrown pottery while he was here. They were also able to take a field trip to Jim's studio where the art students participated in a Raku firing pottery process. The Raku process is historically used to make Japanese tea sets. It was a wonderful hands-on learning experience for all!

Project ClickSafe

Empowering parents and young children with the internet and digital safety knowledge was the vision of Eileen Zanke, Ferndale Area Elementary School Guidance Counselor.

With the green light from Ferndale Area administration, Eileen relied on some of her professional ties at the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown to make the vision a reality. Bob Knipple, Director of the Office of Professional Outreach and Development pursued the idea with UPJ administrators and the ball has continued to roll. In addition to UPJ, the project is being developed by five partner school districts: Ferndale Area, Greater Johnstown, Richland, Westmont, and Windber.

Project ClickSafe will address issues relating to a number of digital technologies and applications including: the internet, chat rooms, blogs, instant messaging, electronic communities (i.e., "MySpace.com"), and text messaging. Electronic bullying is one of the issues that will be addressed.

The activities of the group will focus on three specific goals:

1. Awareness: Informing parents and other community members of the ways technology is used and the dangers that exist.
2. Education: Offering practical solutions on how to minimize the risks associated with technology usage and what to do if it is suspected that a child has been put at risk.
3. Resources: Providing community members with resources to minimize the risk of technology usage.

A "schools" working group will focus on developing educational programs and student advisory groups in local schools. To date, Mrs. Zanke has held two student advisory board meetings that addressed potential internet safety materials that can be integrated into the curriculum, and potential internet safety awareness events that will be student driven by the ClickSafe Student Advisory Board. Ferndale Area School District representatives include: Seniors: **Brock Rummel and Jessica Jung** and Juniors: **Eric Wentz and Jessica Tighe**.

The first Project ClickSafe community event was held on Tuesday, May 15, 2007. The program was held at the UPJ Living and Learning Center and deemed a huge success.

SADD 2nd Year Event Highly Successful

On May 18, 2007, the Ferndale Area SADD (Students Against Destructive Decisions) Chapter hosted the 2nd annual Post Prom Party. This event was highly successful with 56 students and 21 chaperones in attendance at Ferndale Area Junior/Senior High School. Starting at 11:00 p.m., the activities included a Velcro wall, climbing wall, sumo suits, touch screen machines, ping pong, video games, movies and more. Food and drinks were provided throughout the night and concluded with breakfast in the morning. There was tremendous school spirit as parents, students and teachers worked together to provide a fun, safe, and very decorative atmosphere.

Fundraisers were held throughout the year to assist with the cost of the Post Prom. For instance, the two dodge ball tournaments were a huge hit, with teams consisting of students, teachers and alumni. The tournaments were quite entertaining and helped to promote school spirit. In addition,

generous monetary contributions from local businesses and a \$500 grant from the Cambria County Drug and Alcohol Agency helped to fund many Post Prom events. Several area businesses also donated various gifts for prize giveaways to students attending Post Prom.

Thank you to the parents, students, staff, and businesses for joining forces and providing this wonderful opportunity to our school district. We are looking forward to next year's Post Prom and intend on making this a tradition that will be an exciting and safe alternative on Prom Night.

Also, this year SADD sponsored a Charity Volleyball Event on April 27, 2007. This brought back alumni from all different graduating classes and gave them an opportunity to play against other alumni, high school students and teachers. The proceeds from this event benefitted Beginnings (affiliate of United Way).

Career Linking Academy

This year, our seniors participated in a tremendous opportunity that was provided through Goodwill Industries' Southern Alleghenies Career Education Partnership for Youth (led by Pam Evans-Hartland) and FASD's Project 720 Committee. During the "PSSA Week" 51 seniors headed to the Greater Johnstown Career and Technology Center, for a week of career based activities designed to promote, and in some cases inspire, their post-high school plans. Each day, students had an opportunity to hear stories of success, and sometimes failure, from a number of business representatives from the Greater Johnstown area. These business men and women represented the main industry clusters from our area: Health, Manufacturing, Information Technology, and Construction.

Throughout the week, students focused on a number of career awareness activities including preparing job applications, and writing resumes, cover letters, and thank you letters. They also learned about surviving their first year in college, as well as received information on financial issues, including credit card traps, that they might encounter once they are on their own.

Without a doubt, there were two highlights to the week. Fifteen human resource managers conducted interviews of all students. They provided them with feedback on their interviewing strengths and weaknesses, helping students to identify ways to sell themselves to potential employers.

The other highlight was the job shadowing component of the program. Each student submitted three career fields they would like to job shadow. Students were then accompanied to one of 21 local employers who opened their doors to share their careers. Employers included: HF Lenz, Attorney Linda Fleming, UPJ, Melius & Hockenberry, Tribune Democrat, WJAC, Conemaugh Medical Center, Coroner's Office, CTC, Lockheed, Phoenix Rehabilitation, Penelec, JARI, Red Lobster, Sears Optometry, East Hills Medical Center, Crichton Center, PA Academy of Cosmetology, Ohioople State Park, and Ferndale Area Elementary School.

Next year we plan on continuing the Career Linking Academy. In addition, our Project 720 monies will help to provide on-site career fairs, and an on-site college fair. We're excited about the future of career awareness at Ferndale Area!

On May 4 through 6, the Ferndale Area Band went on their trip to Winchester, Virginia to march in the 80th annual Shenandoah Apple Blossom Fireman's Parade. The band marched the mile and a half parade on Friday and was **awarded second place in their division**. Athletic Highlights

Junior High

Of special note was the **District 6 Sportsmanship Award** presented by the District 6 volleyball officials. This speaks highly of our girls, the coaches, and the fans of FAHS volleyball.
- Both the boys' and girls' basketball teams had successful seasons. The boys, under the direction of Coach Wissinger, qualified for the District 6 playoffs for the first time in several years. The girls, with Coach Crisafulli in charge, won 2 playoff games in District 6 and advanced to Inter-District play before falling to Union at Clarion University. The girls ended the season with 20 wins.
- **Kary Roberts** became the 5th student to score 1,000 points in Ferndale Area boys' basketball history. He finished with 1,002 points which tied him for 4th place on the career list.
- **Sarah McAteer** finished her career with 1,420 points, moving her into 2nd place on the girls' basketball list. Additionally, it should be noted that Sarah completed her senior year with 12 varsity letters --- the maximum possible to receive at Ferndale Area.
- Kary and Sarah plan to continue their basketball careers at their respective colleges next season.
