

othing Bat the Facts: West Side students went batty - literally - during an educational presentation by a Cambria County Conservation District representative. Students learned about both common myths and facts about bats. They also had the opportunity to view a bat skeleton and a bat that had been preserved by a taxidermist.

Success for All: Both West Side and East Side utilize the "Success for All" Curriculum, which is an evidenced-based model aligned to PSSA test standards. Lynne Williams is West Side's Reading Facilitator, and Laurie Slacum is among the "Success for All" consultants who visit West Side classrooms and meet with teachers several times a year.

Newsworthy Endeavor: Many West Side teachers have incorporated the Newspaper in Education (NIE) program into their classrooms. NIE is a cooperative effort between newspapers and local schools. The Johnstown Tribune-Democrat partnered with area businesses to provide newspapers to local schools. Mrs. Kobal's third grade class uses the newspaper as a "living history textbook" that not only is useful as a social studies supplement but as literacy and math tools as well. Mrs. Kobal's students completed scavenger hunts and other basic activities while becoming familiar with newspapers.



Johnstown Middle School Student Council annually participates in a fundraiser to benefit Make-A-Wish Foundation. This year, the goal was set at \$1,500. Through mid-October, the Student Council had closed within about \$800 of the goal. If successful in reaching the \$1,500 mark, Johnstown Middle School will have raised a combined \$10,000 in the past 10 years. A faculty versus students flag football game raised \$675. The trip included lunch and a backstage tour for the students.



"She was my biggest fan," Vicki, a senior at JHS, said of her mother during an interview that appeared in The Tribune-Democrat. "I miss her a lot. I know she feels that it's her job and she wants to fight for our country, and I understand that. But, it's really hard. I come home and I want to tell her all my stories about what happened. So, I really rely on my friends now."

Those friends on the soccer team helped Johnstown finish 9-9 in the regular season. The Lady Trojans fell in the district playoff game at Hollidaysburg, but coach Alyssa Arcurio's program is poised in the right direction because of players such as Vicki, a four-year starter and team co-captain.

"I just pray for the troops, and I thank them all," Vicki said in The Tribune-Democrat article. "I thank all my soccer girls and coaches for a great season."


