West Side's Mrs. Kegg organized the fundraiser four years ago. Mrs. Leckey's students count and wrap change. Welcome to West Side: West Side Elementary held an orientation for preschool (K4) and Kindergarten students on August 26 in the gymnasium. Mrs. Lynn Berkebile, a K4 teacher, welcomed the parents and students to West Side and presented an overall view of the K4 and Kindergarten programs. After an introduction to their classroom teachers, the parents and students were taken to each individual classroom by their child's teacher. The teachers presented parents with a packet that included district information.

Summer Program: West Side School played host to ACRP's Summer Treatment Program this year. This program provided treatment for children ages 5 to 12 with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder or similar disorders. learning needs. The ultimate goal is to build on a child's social and academic skills so he or she can return to school ready to succeed.

Each child received an individually designed treatment plan. These plans are carried out under the supervision of mental health professionals, specially trained staff, and a licensed psychologist.

Children are placed in groups of 18 and six staff members are present to supervise activities. The group stays together throughout the day so that children learn to work and cooperate in a group setting. Children spend two hours daily working in a therapeutic classroom setting to carry out behavior modification plans designed to address each child's specific needs in the classroom setting. For the remainder of the day, children participated in therapeutically-based recreational activities. Group time included age appropriate discussion, sports, and other recreational and communitybased activities. Children also participated in group problem solving discussions, social skills training and other treatment strategies.

**Science Center:** West Side's Mrs. Tomak's fifth grade class made Room D25 into a scientific study. A Science Center was created in the back of the classroom, providing a display of a wide variety of things found in nature. The class collection included bird nests, snake skins, including one of a Central American Boa, and various species of sea life, including the shell of a seahorse crab. Plant fossils and skulls of different animals also were on display. The students also participated in dissecting different species and completed a creation of rainforest posters. Students also interact by displaying "class pets" such as Leo the desert gecko, salamanders, tadpoles and bull frogs.

II Sewn Up: Mrs. Crooks' grade 6 students have successfully assembled an impressive community service project. The Johnstown Middle School students sewed lap quilts that will be presented to individuals in nursing homes, veterans homes, hospitals or hospice care facilities.

The students were involved in all aspects of the quilt-making process as they measured, cut and pinned the fabric squares prior to the actual sewing of the quilts.

For many of the students, it was their first experience of using a sewing machine. The students worked cooperatively, using both mastered skills and newly acquired skills.

The hands-on activity fostered responsibility and encouraged the quilters to work with others as well as working independently. The middle school students completed approximately 10 quilts by the last day of school in 2007-08.

Capital Visit: Sixty-five members of the JMS Student Council visited our nation's capital in late-May. The three-day visit to Washington, D.C., included stops at some of our nation's most famous historical sites and government buildings and monuments. Students also had an opportunity to tour the National Zoo. Student Council officers last school year included President Isabella Cacicia, Vice President Chelsev Meyers, Treasurer Teasha Thomas and Secretary Deanna Sanders.

Character Builder: Greater Johnstown Middle School will utilize a character education curriculum from WiseSkills Incorporated this academic year. The program is comprised of 32 interdisciplinary units that each focus on a positive character trait such as responsibility or honesty.

Through direct instruction and group activities, students will evaluate hypothetical scenarios, analyze famous quotes, and role play to synthesize the given topics.

The program will be taught in grades six through eight as part of a morning enrichment period that alternates between character education and PSSA test preparation in math and reading.

Research suggests that character education programs have two positive effects: Those programs lower discipline referrals and increase students' grades and test scores.

Additionally, advocates of character education also argue that the programs help to offset the impact of the media, a popular culture that has increasingly focused on negative behaviors in recent times.





The Lady Trojans softball team made history by capturing the District 6 Class AAA championship this spring. Coach Randy Romesberg's squad finished 17-4 including a 6-1 victory over Indian Valley in the district title contest.

Johnstown lost a 2-1 heartbreaker to defending state champion Susquehannock in the state playoffs but with only one graduating senior on the team, there appears to be more success on the horizon. The Trojans are 49-11 in the past three seasons.

Pitcher Megan McMillen has 550 career strikeouts, including 218 during her junior season. Members of the championship team included senior Lauren Carosi; juniors Katelyne Golby, Katelin Lindrose, Lindsay Lovrich, Kristin Mangus, McMillen,

Hall of Famer: Greater Johnstown High School's veteran baseball coach Dee Dee Osborne was inducted into the 15th AAABA Hall of Fame Class on Aug. 9 at the Pasquerilla Conference Center.

Coach Osborne, who enters this school year with 197 career wins at JHS, had a long and distinguished career as a manager and general manager in the local AAABA League.

His induction into the AAABA Hall of Fame was the result of Osborne's leading his teams to 541 regular-season victories as either a manager or general manager -- including 267 regular-season wins as a field manager. He managed four teams in the prestigious AAABA Tournament and, including his tenure as a general manager, he was a part of nine tournament teams overall.

Many of coach Osborne's former players went on to success in college, the minor leagues and even the major leagues. Among those are former major leaguers Mike Holtz, Keith Williams, Joe Vitko and Mike Ryan.

Greater Johnstown graduate Tom Walter -- one of Osborne's former players and a former Johnstown Junior League MVP -- introduced coach Osborne during the AAABA Hall of Fame banquet. Walter currently is head coach of the University of New Orleans baseball program.

1,000 Points of Light spotlights the figurative rebirth
of one of the Greater Johnstown
School District's hidden gems.
The athletic facility formerly known
as Fichtner Field underwent major
renovations in the past year and
reopened in grand fashion on
August 11.

Formerly a junior high football field, the facility was reconfigured and renovated into a first-class baseball field that will play host to Greater Johnstown varsity games.

The new field officially was dedicated during the opening day of the 64th annual AAABA Tournament. The Zanesville (Ohio) Junior Pioneers defeated J.L. Thomas of Cleveland 3-2 in the first game played on the newly renovated diamond.

"This is history in itself being made," Greater Johnstown School Board President Richard Unger said during the ceremony. "This was something that the kids were long waiting for. A couple years ago we got the idea to build the field and we kicked around the idea. When we finally saved enough money and made some good decisions financially, the money was there to do this and we said: 'Let's do it. Let's give our kids their own field.'"

Unger told The Tribune-Democrat in a pre-AAABA Tournament article that the field cost approximately \$100,000 in renovations that

included two new concrete block dugouts, a backstop, home plate and mound as well as a redone infield and outfield. There are bullpens and new fencing. Johnstown School District maintenance staff performed the work, keeping costs down, Unger said.

"We redid the whole field," Unger said. "It is beautiful. Outstanding. For Johnstown High baseball, this has been a long time coming. This is a great field with minimal costs and no tax increase involved. We did everything we could do to enhance the lives of our students and to our community."


