e are the Champions: The Trojans claimed their first District 6 Class AAA football championship since 2004 by beating Hollidaysburg in a rematch of last year's final.

Coach Kevin Marabito's team beat the Golden Tigers 21-14 at Mansion Park in Altoona, avenging a loss to Hollidaysburg in 2008.

LaQuinn Stephens-Howling carried 10 times for 85 yards, and Richard Agurs caught four passes from John Siciliano for 63 yards in the title game.

Johnstown's season ended at 8-4 the following week, as state topranked and undefeated Selinsgrove beat the Trojans in a PIAA Class AAA playoff game at Richland's Herlinger Field.

Hoops Rivalry: Greater Johnstown and Altoona have kept their longstanding basketball rivalry alive even though the two programs compete in different conferences.

On Dec. 15, the Trojans boys and girls programs scheduled varsity-only meetings with the Mountain Lions in Altoona.

The Johnstown boys will be guided this season by first-year Trojans head coach Neil Cobaugh. The Johnstown girls team is coached by Chuck DiFalco.

Halftime Performance: Johnstown High's alumni band performed at halftime of the Trojans' Oct. 30 win over visiting Penn Cambria.

Nearly 50 alumni band members attended a pregame dinner and then

participated in the halftime show. Among those alumni performers was Superintendent Dr. Barbara Parkins, who played the clarinet.

NFL Alumnus: Greater Johnstown High School graduate LaRod Stephens-Howling continues to make a name for himself in the National Football League.

Stephens-Howling earned NFC

Special Teams Player of the Week on Dec. 1 after returning a kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown in the Arizona Cardinals' 20-17 loss to the Tennessee Titans on Nov. 29.

LaRod, who rushed for more than 4,000 yards at Johnstown High before playing four years at Pitt, also downed three punts inside the Titans' 5-yard line during the game and made one tackle.

Wrestling Moves: The Trojans wrestling team was among the field at the 42nd Conemaugh Township Tournament to open the 2009-10 season on Dec. 11-12. Coach Gary Radnotti's team also will compete in the LHAC and District 6-AAA.

V Time: Greater Johnstown School District in conjunction with WJAC-TV Channel 6 introduced a monthly "job shadowing" program that enables two Johnstown High communication students to participate in the behind-thescenes aspects involved with Channel 6's news broadcasts. From production, to news gathering to working with meteorologist Jim Burton on weather forecasting, the students saw first-hand the process of putting together a newscast.

"The greatest benefit is that kids get to see a career before they spend four years and a lot of money in college," said JHS communications/graphic arts teacher Mr. Richard Capraun. "In four hours we can show kids nearly every aspect of a job. We can let them know that it's a career they can truly spend the rest of their life with, or if this is a field that might not be for them. WJAC has really helped kids who want to be in front of the camera or behind the camera."

The students attend production meetings, observe the control room operations and the on-air talent at work.

Yule Like the Drum Line: Greater Johnstown High School provided

the drum line for rock performer B.E. Taylor during the singer's Christmas Show on Dec. 8 at the Pasquerilla Performing Arts Center on the Pitt-Johnstown campus.

In every performance, Taylor includes a local high school drum line in the show. "It ties into the community," Taylor said in a Tribune-Democrat interview prior to the concert. "These are their kids. The drum line plays one song with us, and then we feature

them in whatever we want to do."

Models of Teaching Success:

Three Johnstown High School educators were named model teachers by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. Dr. William Brotz, Miss Robyn Cummings and Mr. Robert Heinrich were selected from 40 teachers nominated statewide.

Learning Sciences Services filmed the teachers in April. The films will be used in an online masters-level education.

Mr. Heinrich demonstrated Power-Teaching in an American History class. Dr. Brotz and Miss Cummings modeled Team Teaching during a Chemistry class.

Points of Light spotlights the combined efforts of students, staff, administrators, students' families, alumni and local contributors who have made The Trojan College Access program a success.

The Trojan College Access Center is in its third year of operation. When the program started there were only 39 percent of Johnstown High students who went on to attend post secondary schools.

This year, our enrollment in post-secondary schools has risen to 69 percent.

The first year of the Trojan College Access Center, the program raised enough money to provide seven students with a total of \$13,000 in scholarships.

In Year 2, with the help of local colleges such as Cambria Rowe and the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown, as well as the Greater Johnstown Housing Authority, The Jacob Fend Foundation and all of the people and businesses who donated to the Trojan College Access Scholarship Fund, a total of \$45,000 in scholarships went to 21 Johnstown High students.


his GJSD Board of Directors purchased new uniforms for the Trojan Marching Bands at JHS and JMS.
