The program also teaches the importance of food safety and germ control. Teachers feel it is a good, healthy way to educate students about the importance of hand washing before handling their food.


SPOTLIGHT ON...

residential Art: This wasn't just another class assignment. Eighth grader Janaye Schroll's work attracted attention from students throughout JMS as well as her Civics teacher Mrs. Tomak. Prior to the November presidential election, Mrs. Tomak assigned her students to create a campaign poster for one of the candidates, Barack Obama or John McCain. While most students cut and pasted photos from newspapers and magazines to finish their projects, Janaye produced what has been called a "flawless sketch" of now-President Obama. The posters were displayed in the JMS cafeteria.

Education and Technology: Johnstown Middle School Principal Darren Buchko announced that JMS has been awarded nearly \$150,000 from the Enhancing Education Through Technology (EETT) grant, a competitive grant awarded to 47 institutions for a total of \$9.3 million. The money will be used to upgrade the school's instructional technology hardware and infrastructure.

Buchko plans to use the funds to fulfill a variety of projects, including: audio/visual upgrades to the auditorium, new student workstations in computer labs, interactive mobile carts and labs, SmartBoards, Lcd projectors, as well as digital cameras and

camcorders. Adding even more benefit to the district, East Side Elementary and West Side Elementary will receive the replaced hardware components that remain in good working order.

Buchko recognized sixth grade teacher Mike Dadey for his hard work during the grant application process.

JMS is Lovin' It:

McDonald's Restaurants presented JMS sixth grade Learning Support teacher Mrs. Elaine Crooks a \$500 MAC (Make Activities Count) Grant to recognize student achievement. Mike Engleka, Manager of the McDonald's Restaurant presented the grant on Jan. 15.

MAC Grants enable teachers to purchase resources for completing hands-on projects within the classroom. The grant proposal was entitled "Peace by Piece."

A total of \$365 will enable JMS to pur-

chase a sewing machine and material for the making of lap quilts for a community service project. The student-made quilts will be given to individuals in nursing homes, veteran homes, hospitals and hospice care. The hands-on activity fosters responsibility, and teaches students the value of working with others, as well as working independently.

PSA Contest: JMS students in Mr. Wes Bowser's eighth grade Civics class and Mr. Jason Moore's seventh and eighth grade Literature classes participated in the Pennsylvania National Guard Counter Drug Program's "Project Sound Off!" contest.

The public service announcement contest has students produce their own radio or TV

commercials. The theme is to tell parents and adults what they might not know about drug and alcohol abuse, and to give them information to help them recognize, prevent or stop abuse.

Johnstown Middle School submitted five videos and four radio spots to the statewide contest.



Trojans senior basketball

surpassed the 1,000point milestone in a
home game against Bishop Carroll and

continued his outstanding season as district playoff competition neared. Through 17 games Weatherly had 284 points, 162 rebounds, 41 steals and 28 blocked shots. The Trojans used depth and teamwork to win 14 of their first 17 outings under first-year Johnstown coach Dave Roman Jr.

Net Results: The Greater Johnstown girls basketball team continued to show improvement in the tough LHAC. Sophomore Tynesha Smith averaged 13.5 points and 3.6 steals a game as the regular-season wound down. Senior Lindsay Lovrich averaged 6.5 points and 4.2 rebounds a game.

Ice Men: The Trojans hockey team continued a successful 25th anniversary season, going 10-5-2 in its first 17 games of PIHL Open Division play. Goaltender David Dunkleberger had a 10-3-2 record with a 2.12 goals against average and .919 save percentage with four shutouts. Derek Grove had 21 goals and 31 points. Daniel Smith, Tess Weaver and Travis Weaver each had 17 points.

Grove, Smith, Ben Pearce, Dunkleberger, Rick Montgomery, Travis
Weaver, Jon Maurizio and Zach Henry
each represented Johnstown in the
2nd annual Brad Wess Memorial
Scholastic Showcase that honored
the memory of the former Forest Hills
High School hockey player and provided a scholarship to an area senior.

Grappling for Success: Two freshman student-athletes have stepped up to the varsity ranks and are compiling big wins and numbers on the Johnstown wrestling team. Both Gervon Simon (160 pounds) and Malcolm Harris (103 pounds) are on target for 20-plus wins this season. Gervon Simon had compiled a 15-8 record through early February, winning 11 straight matches at one point and looking to build on that number. Malcolm Harris placed second at the Conemaugh Township Tournament and had a 16-6 record. Both wrestlers and their teammates represented the district well on the mat.

ational Spotlight: Greater Johnstown High School has been recognized by U.S. News & World Report as a Bronze Medal recipient in the magazine's rankings of America's best high schools.

A total of 21,069 public high schools in 48 states were analyzed using data from the 2006-07 school year. A threestep process is used to determine the rankings. The first two steps ensure that the schools serve all of their students well, using state proficiency standards as the measuring benchmarks. A third step assessed the degree to which

schools prepare students for college-level work. A great high school, the report said, "must serve all its students well, not just those who are bound for college and that it must be able to produce measurable academic outcomes to show that the school is successfully educating its student body across a range of performance indicators."

The methodology used for the school evaluation was developed by Standard & Poor's.

Principal Dan Resenic also noted that the current senior class achieved the highest level yet since the PSSA test was instituted as a condition of the federal No Child Left Behind legislation. JHS was recognized statewide as the school with the largest one-year improvement in assessment scores in the state of Pennsylvania. The percentage of students scoring proficient on the

Pennsylvania math assessment has doubled since the inception of the exam in 2002. Improvement in reading scores is nearly as impressive.

Quizzical Nature: The Trojans Scholastic Quiz team is out to another impressive start. Mixing brains with brawn on a Steelers' Super Bowl Sunday, the Quiz team notched a victory over Forest Hills on Feb. 1 at the WPSU-TV station in State College.

Johnstown then faced Juniata Valley in the next round while competing against Central Pennsylvania schools in the largest bracket.


