

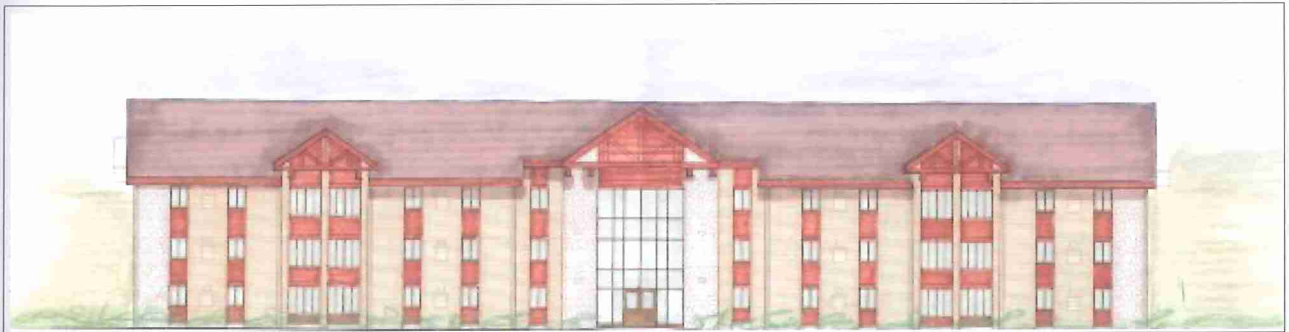
Veritas et Virtus

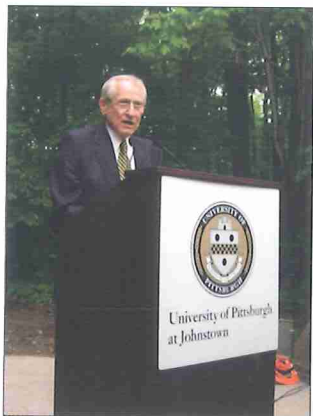
As I write this letter, the hills around the UPJ campus are on fire with the colors of autumn. A rainy summer has given way to a glorious crisp fall, and the sidewalks on campus are busy with the traffic of students, professors, and staff moving from classes to meetings and games to meals and dormitories to lectures and concerts. Except for the cell phones and laptops, it's probably not much different from the days when you traversed this campus or the Asphalt Campus or Johnstown Pitt. A closer look will tell you that much is going on.

Pride in UPJ Video

After 600 students graduated in May, the summer was busy with the creation of the *Pride in UPJ* video. This video shows how UPJ has touched the lives of fellow alumni. It can be viewed by visiting our website at www.upj.pitt.edu. We are confident you'll enjoy it.

Ground Broken for New Residence Hall

We also broke ground for the first building constructed in a decade. The new state-of-the-art 35,200-square-foot residence facility will include 24 student apartments with 109 beds, as well as one apartment for the resident director. Each apartment will have two full bathrooms, a living room, and a kitchenette. The three-story residence hall will house a central common space for a television lounge, lobby, laundry, and conference rooms.



The June 2 groundbreaking ceremony was attended by 150.

The cost of the building is \$4,922,000 and is another addition to the \$20 million invested into

physical improvements to the campus since 1996. This building will join the five residence halls and complement the variety of campus housing options. The most recent additions of housing were the Living/Learning Center in 1994 and renovations this summer to Hickory Hall, originally built in 1970.

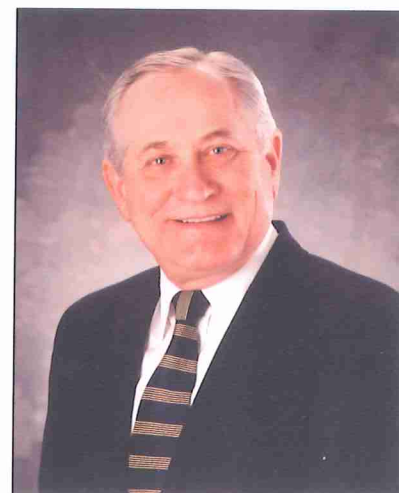

Local alumna sets an example of community and business leadership and lifelong learning

Esther Goldhaber Jacovitz (UPJ '36, CAS '37) is a woman who leads by example.

When the Esther Goldhaber Jacovitz Poetry Series was inaugurated last spring at UPJ, it was yet another of the many ways in which Mrs. Jacovitz has demonstrated her commitment to the UPJ campus and the Johnstown community.

A Johnstown native, Mrs. Jacovitz attended Junior Pitt from 1933 to 1936 majoring in history with a minor in English. She attended the University of Pittsburgh in Oakland from 1936-1937. She obtained her BS in secretarial studies in 1939 from Carnegie College.

She reminisced about those days, noting that "a credit at the University cost \$10, but that was a lot of money back then because there was nowhere to get the money except to work for it. There were no bank loans, no government loans, and no scholarships."

She went to the School of Law at Pitt when there were only three women in the freshman class.

"In those years, a woman could not move to another city and rent an apartment. It was expected that she would return home," Mrs. Jacovitz said. So she returned to Johnstown to work in the family business, the Pepsi Cola Bottling Company, which had gotten its start as the Tulip Bottling Company.

In 1943, Esther married Sidney Jacovitz from New York in what could be called a typical World War II romance. A mutual acquaintance told him about her, he started to write, and she answered.

When the couple's daughter, Loisann, was born in 1946, Mrs. Jacovitz stopped working but did volunteer work all over city.

In the early 1960s, Mrs. Jacovitz returned to UPJ to get her education credits. She taught seventh-grade

English at Joseph Johns Junior High from 1964 to 1967. She then went on to teach history, economics, and political science at Johnstown High School between 1968 and 1970, retiring to go back into her family's bottling business until it was sold in 1984.

In 1984, she founded the Esther Goldhaber Jacovitz Scholarship Fund at UPJ, which provides grants to full-time female junior or senior students.

After retirement, Esther again returned to UPJ to adult classes in sociology and psychology. She recalls that Dr. Daniel Santoro, professor of sociology, would call on her in class to tell students about the strikes.

In 1994, with the vision and leadership of UPJ Advisory Board member Rosemary Pawlowski, Mrs. Jacovitz gave her support to the creation of the BottleWorks Ethnic Arts Center, housed in the building where the Tulip Bottling Company was founded.

She has spent much of her life traveling. She was among the first Americans to enter China in 1976, before which she underwent a complete investigation by the FBI. She has also visited Israel, Europe, Hungary, Romania, Scandinavia, New Zealand, and Australia.

"I truly miss the interaction that occurs in the classroom," Mrs. Jacovitz said. "All my life, I've been a student."

Noted Texas heart surgeon is speaker at 2004 Commencement

Dr. Malcolm H. Bremer, Chief of Staff at North East Medical Center Hospital, Humble, Texas, a leading Houston cardiovascular surgeon, and 1963 University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown "Asphalt Campus" alumnus, delivered the address at the UPJ Commencement May 1.

A Johnstown native, Dr. Bremer earned his MD from Hahnemann Medical College, Philadelphia. Dr. Bremer is an active staff member at Northeast Medical Center Hospital and Kingwood Medical Center Hospital and consulting staff member at Healthsouth Rehabilitation Hospital and Plaza Rehabilitation Hospital. He studied under famed heart surgeon Dr. Michael DeBakey.

The well-known Houston area physician called his visit to UPJ "the greatest reward I've received in my career."

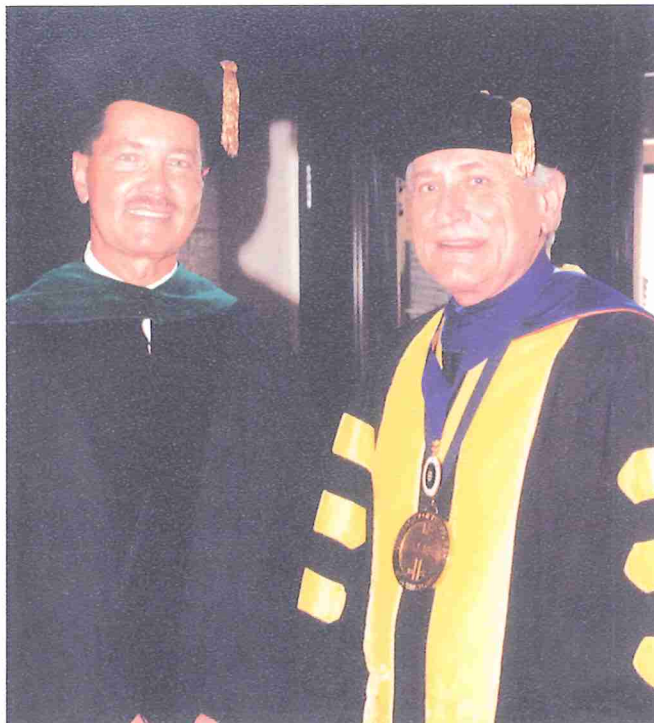
He said that he had been on the Richland Township campus only once before, when, as a fraternity pledge at Cypress Avenue, he was "brought up to the newly-donated land blindfolded and left."

Dr. Bremer is a member of the American College of Phlebology, American College of Chest Physicians, American Heart Association, American Medical Association, Harris County Medical Society, Houston Academy of Medicine, International College of

Physicians and Surgeons, International Society for Endovascular Surgery, Michael E. DeBakey International Surgical Society, Ninth District Medical Society of Texas, Society of Vascular Ultrasound, Southern Medical Association, Texas Medical Association, and Texas Medical Foundation.

Dr. Bremer told the assembly how his enjoyment of music and his background as a church organist influenced his coming to what was then known as "Junior Pitt."

The dean of the college heard him play at a church service, recognized his name on an application for admission, admitted him, and almost immediately "volunteered" him to be the college's organist at academic and social functions.

He encouraged the Class of 2004 to "follow your dream, use your intuition, and set your goals high." He also exhorted members to take care of their bodies and minds.

He told of how he moved to Houston from Pennsylvania to further his career, and how an invitation to get away for a weekend by sailing on a colleague's boat led to meeting his wife Angelique, racing regionally and off shore, and competing in two national sailing championship events.

The couple now has four children, all of whom sail.

Dr. Bremer said he is proud of his Johnstown and "Junior Pitt" roots. "It really is a treat," he told the Class of 2004.

We both have fond memories of the “campus.” Tom was on Student Council and was *The Panther Cub* editor. I also worked on the paper. John Crowe, the English professor, was the advisor. He had introduced us and strongly encouraged us to become involved with the paper, which we did.

I also was accompanist for the Glee Club and was active in the Drama Club and the Women’s Association.

We had a “Jazz Band.” Tom played trumpet and I played piano. We had about eight other members in the group. We played for dances held after basketball games and other times. We all loved doing it until the Union came in and shut us down!

After two years, we transferred to the Oakland campus where I received a degree in elementary education and Tom received one in English. He then went on to Harvard Law School.

After his graduation, we returned to Johnstown. He opened a law practice and I had five children.

In 1964, I started teaching in the elementary grades in the Greater Johnstown School District. I retired in 1996.

Dr. Biddle came to Tom in 1976 and asked him to consider teaching Business Law which he did for 20 years, part time.

We both feel we had an excellent beginning at the “Asphalt Campus,” and it’s a great thrill to see the beautiful university it has become!

I became a freshman at Junior Pitt, as we called it, in the fall of 1944. In 1947, I went to main campus for my senior year, and graduated from there with a BS degree in 1948. After graduation, I worked as a lab technician in the pathology department at Conemaugh Valley Memorial Hospital.

In 1945, I met Robert E. Anderson at Junior Pitt, where he, too, started as a freshman. We began dating that year, and although he went to the main campus the following year, we didn't stop dating - although it was mostly long distance. He graduated with a degree in electrical engineering in 1948. We were married in 1951. Unfortunately, he died of cancer in 1976.

I have lived in Erie since we were married, and since 1984, I've been writing a weekly column, *Nature's Way*, for the *Erie Times-News*. A small item that I began writing for the *Morning News* in 1977 continues to be published weekly since the two papers combined. Ten years of it were compiled into a booklet titled *Nature Watch* with co-author Jean Stull.

Enclosed is a photo of the friends I made during my freshman year, friends who remained throughout our days on the Asphalt Campus. We called ourselves the DDKs - the Darn Dumb Kids.

When Matthew S. Mazonkey, senior political science major and president of Student Senate, first visited UPJ, he was 11 years old. He'd heard the stories about UPJ from his parents, Stephen and Pamela (Moret) Mazonkey ('78) of Lower Burrell, Pa., who met and fell in love here. Then one day his dad, a former Mountain Cat men's basketball player, said to the family, "We haven't been back to campus in a long time. It might be nice to see some of the new facilities and visit the Sports Center." UPJ was just at the end of the "Shaping a Future" capital campaign, and had added several new buildings, including the Zambas Aquatic Center, the Whalley Chapel, and the Pasquerilla Performing Arts Center.

"I remember what a large campus it was, and I was really impressed with the residence halls, as my parents were when they came here," Matt noted. "It's interesting to realize that the residence halls were a major selling point both for my parents when they were looking at colleges, and for my sister and me. They make UPJ a great place not only to study, but also to live."

Back in the 1970s, Pam was one of the first students to live in the UPJ townhouses, and Steve lived in Oak Hall and in the North Lodges, which were also brand new.

Not only did Matt's parents attend UPJ, but also several other family members.

"I waited a year after high school to attend college, so my sister Judy and I entered UPJ together," Pam reminisced. "We started at UPJ in the fall of 1974 when there was a housing shortage and our first month was spent at Del's Motel. When we finally made it to campus, we were lucky enough

to get a room in the basement of Laurel Hall. Judy actually met my husband first because she was a UPJ cheerleader and he was on the basketball team. Steve played for four years for UPJ and his brother Tony started at UPJ in the fall of 1975 and he also played ball for four years. Steve and Tony played with Don Elzer, Curt Miller, Dave Namey, Kermit Koenig, Rich Ragan, Scott Edgar, Chubby Wells, and Bill Starn, to name a few.

"Steve played in the old gymnasium that is now the Student Union building. His brother Tony got to play his senior year in the new Sports Center. Steve played for coaches Dave Campbell and Jim Basista.

"Steve and I got together in October of our freshman year, we dated during our four years of college and got married in 1980. Our wedding was like a huge UPJ reunion because so many of our UPJ friends and family were part of our wedding party. Even my younger cousin, Liza Iozzi, who was in our wedding, ended up going to UPJ, and she was one of the founders of Alpha Sigma Alpha sorority!"

In the second generation, Matt's sister Heather joined him at UPJ last year as a pre-business major, and his cousin, Chris Conti, is in his first term, also in pre-business.

Now in his last year at UPJ, Matt calls his UPJ experience "overwhelmingly positive and a great chapter in my life."

"Coming as a freshman I had intentions of transferring to the Pittsburgh campus, but after my first term, UPJ became more than a second home to me," Matt said. "My decision to spend four years here made a huge impact on me. I have received top-notch academic training, developed one-on-one relationships with

faculty and staff, and met people who genuinely care about how I am doing.”

Matt is a classic student leader. In addition to Student Senate, he has been a member of the Programming Board, Judicial Board, residence staff, Student Council on World Affairs, Blue and Gold Society, and Homecoming Committee, and volunteers 15 hours each week with political organizations in the community. He also serves as an admissions tour guide.

“After I graduate, I hope to give back to the place that has given so much to me,” Matt said.

“I know our children will come away with many good memories and friends, and a well-rounded, quality education.”

“Matt was destined to be a UPJ alumnus because his mother, father, and godparents all attended UPJ,” Pam said. “I have a staff accountant who works for me who is a UPJ alumna (that definitely helped her on her interview), my human resources representative at Giant Eagle is a UPJ graduate, and I just took a position in Giant Eagle and my new boss is a UPJ graduate. He told me that he recruits many of his summer accounting interns from UPJ.”

Steve and Pam maintain contacts with several friends they met while at UPJ, including M. Mitchell Fetterolf ('78), Somerset, Advisory Board member.

“Mom and Dad kindled strong friendships at UPJ that are still lasting today,” Matt said.

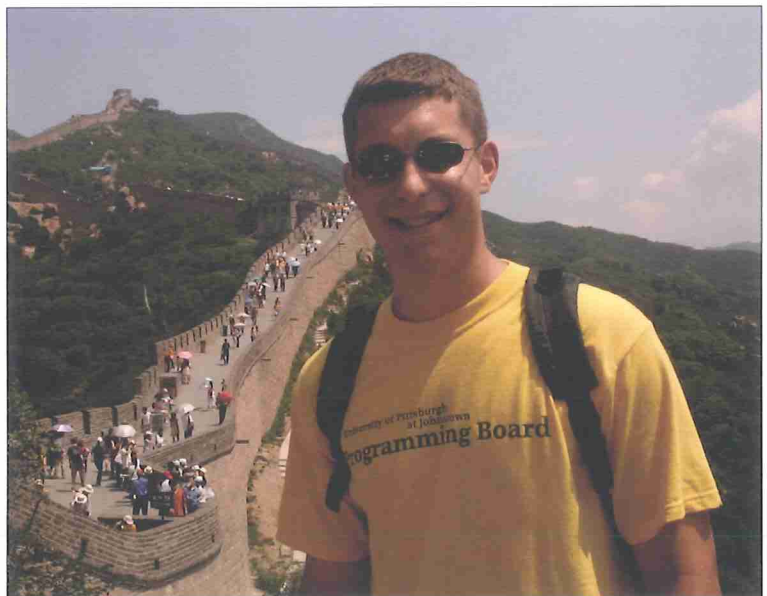

The people that we both met our freshman year, ended up being the friends we stayed with throughout our four years of college and are the friends we keep in touch with now.

Then Heather saw how much Matt liked the campus, so she decided to go there, too. My sister Judy’s son, Chris, also decided to attend UPJ. He is a freshman this year and he loves the campus. 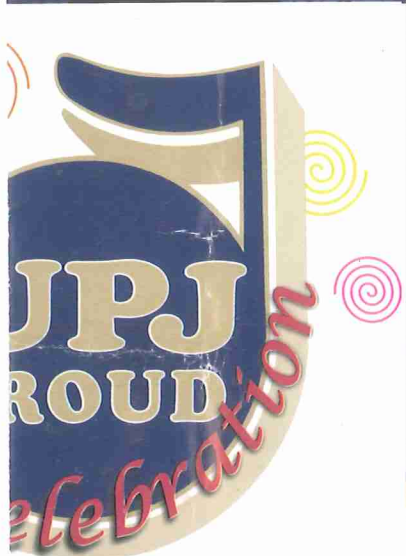
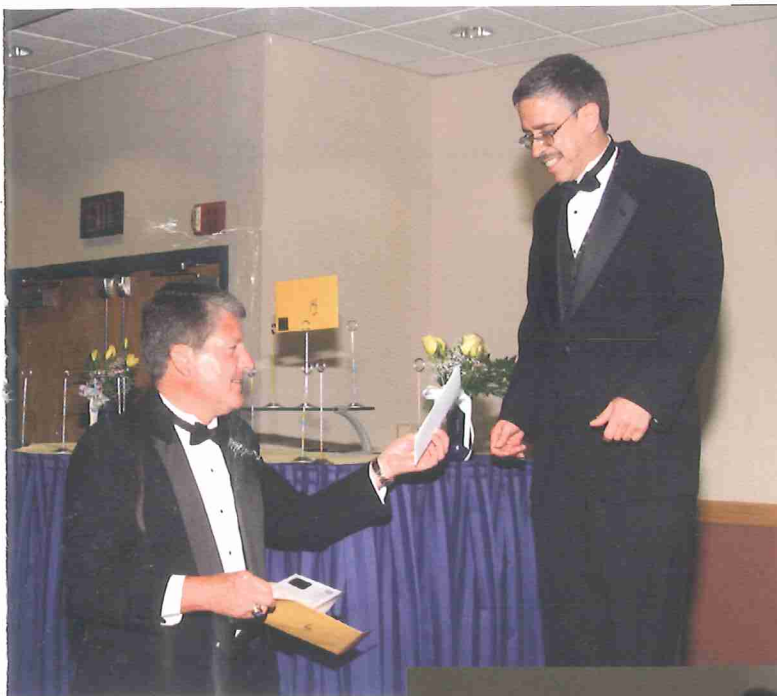
“UPJ has something for everyone – our two children are complete opposites, but they both love UPJ and both are having their own unique college experiences,” Pam said.
