

Trees for Wildlife

With a little planning, the benefits we usually expect from trees can easily be multiplied to also benefit wildlife. For example, when planting for ornamental purposes, by knowing which trees attract birds you might plant a flowering dogwood or when planting

for quick shade, male boxelder being favored instead of hybrid poplars, the boxelder being favored by at least five species of birds, the poplar by none. You can directly affect the variety and quality of wildlife around your home and in the community.

It's the time of year when April showers

bring May flowers along with the beautiful blossoms and trees throughout the streets of Southmont Borough. On Saturday, May 7th at 10:00 a.m., we will celebrate Arbor Day by planting two trees at the corner of Leon and Violet Streets. The planting will be in remembrance of Thomas and Michael Bidelman who were longtime residents of our Borough and in appreciation for the numerous

years of service by Mr. Neil Quinn, former Tax Collector and Mr. William Carstensen Jr., a founding and current member of Greater Johnstown Water Authority. Come and join in on the planting and "Tree City USA" presentation.

Trees are vital to our community health. Tree filled neighborhoods tend to be safer and more sociable. They tend to reduce stress, inspire positive attitudes and fill us with a sense of pride. Trees are important to human health. Did you know 100 (one hundred) trees remove 5 tons of C02 and 1,000 pounds of pollutants per year from

the air we breathe? Southmont Borough has thousands of trees!! Trees help save the

environment by catching up to as much as 1,000 gallons of rainwater per year costing less money for stormwater control. Trees can save a homeowner up to 30% of an-

> nual air conditioning costs or 10-25% of winter heating costs when properly located and planted. Trees add to the value and beauty of our homes. The center for Urban Forest Research estimates the pay back on 100 trees over a 40 year period at \$140,000 when considering benefits (energy,

air quality, runoff, real estate) versus costs (planting, pruning, removal/disposal, irrigation, sidewalk repair, litter, legaladministration).

The Bottom Line:

Quality of life depends on tree benefits.

- Benefits depend on healthy trees.
- Healthy trees require quality care.
- Quality care depends on you.

Throughout this Spring, over 30 trees will be planted

on Olive Street, Diamond Boulevard, Leila Street, Weaver Court, Palliser Street, Gardner Street, Leon Street, Arlington Street, to mention a few. The cost will be covered by residents planting replacement trees, shade tree budget, and donations made to the Southmont Borough Shade Tree Program. The benefits are for all residents

and visitors to our Borough. Take an hour or so to walk through "our urban forest treasure"



Storm Sewer System

To follow-up last year's direct mailing of the PaDEP brochure "When It Rains, It Drains," Southmont is beginning a series of articles to emphasize activities that can assist in protecting the water resources of the area; this article focuses on springtime issues. Washing of cars -PaDep recommends commercial car washes as the best way, the wash water will be treated and/or recycled. Untreated wash water carries soap scum, oils and dirt into the storm sewers & subsequently into the waterways. If you

wash your car at home, try to locate an sewers & a flood protection area where the water will run off into grass or a gravel area that will help filter out these contaminants before they reach the storm sewers. Yard of your yard with storm runoff and into the storm sewers & waterways. This causes algae to grow, which uses up oxygen that aquatic life need to survive.

Much of the watershed in Southmont is comprised of urbanized storm

channel, the receiving waters of the Stonycreek River have been seeing progressive improvement as a result of other cleanup efforts. Public participation in controlling urban work - excessive fertilizer can wash out contaminants will aid the progress of this improvement and the overall quality of life of the region.

Southmont MAY STOP The Recycling Program

It's a shame when the actions of a few ruin the program (benefits) for all. Southmont may stop the recycling program due to items found in the recycling trailer on a continual basis. The recycling trailer is for recyclable items such as clear glass, plastic and cans. It is not a trash receptacle.

People are using the trailer as a trash dumpster. We are constantly finding (on a daily basis) dog waste, hypo needles (not covered and/or tips not broken off), quart cans of used oil, mixing of plastic items with the cans, and colored glass (green and brown bottles) these items are all unacceptable and must stop or the program will stop! Who ever is walking their dog and dropping the waste into the trailer is very inconsiderate be removed. DO NOT include drinkof the Borough employees and of the

program, STOP IT!

If the recycling program is stopped, the garbage fees will be raised. Those of you who wish to recycle will have to do it somewhere else. That means some other municipalities' residents will reap the benefits!

Unfortunately, if you are reading this, you probably aren't the person or persons we are trying to reach. But you do need to understand that we will not be able to continue the Borough recycling program if these inconsiderate actions continue.

Recyclable items are:

Clear glass bottles, jugs or jars from food and beverage only. Must be empty, rinsed, unbroken, and lids must ing glasses, light bulbs, dishes, ceramics, window or safety glass.

Plastic bottles, jugs and jars examples milk jugs, shampoo bottles, detergent bottles, plastic soda bottles, #1 P.E.T & #2 H.D.P.E. on bottom of container. Must be empty, rinsed, lids removed, and crushed (label can stay on). DO NOT include plastic knives, forks or spoons, plastic plates or cups. Cans must be empty, rinsed, labels removed and crushed if possible. DO NOT include aersol or toxic containers.
