### Scholastic Quiz Team Does It Again!

This year's Scholastic Quiz team played to the level of champions. The team garnered invitations to two national tournaments and achieved an unprecedented varsity championship in competition between the Central Western and Mt. Pleasant Area Scholastic Ouiz leagues. Westmont Hilltop's team won the Central Western Quiz League championship by going undefeated for the second consecutive year and defeated Latrobe for championship honors at the "Big 20 Academic Quiz Challenge" tournament played at Mt. Pleasant. The team also won consolation honors at the "Battle of the Burgh" quiz tournament hosted by the University of Pittsburgh.

Scholastic Quiz contests follow the College Bowl format, which demands fast recall of knowledge within a broad range of content areas. Team members were seniors Betsy Schroeder, a four-year team member and captain, and Ron Maurer, a first-year player; sophomore Peter Schroeder; and freshmen Zachary Pozun, Nathan Catanese and Prabhu Narahari.

Betsy was on track to be top individual scorer in the Central Western League, but was forced to miss a game because of a scheduling conflict with soccer league playoffs; both Betsy and Ron finished in the top dozen scorers at Pittsburgh among the more than one hundred players who participated.

In league play, the team competes regularly with thirteen other area schools in weekly competitions from September to November.
League play is held at the Greater Johnstown Career and Technology Center.

### WordMasters Awards at Elementary and Middle Schools

WordMasters is a national contest encouraging growth in vocabulary and verbal reasoning. It takes place three times during the year with two divisions at each grade level. The WordMasters Challenge concentrates on higherlevel word comprehension and logical abilities. For the contest, children were required to complete analogies based on relationships among words they have learned. Kristen Mosbrucker, grade 5, received national recognition for her achievement. Kristen was one of the 23 out of 44,000 who received a perfect score on the WordMasters Test.

During the 1999-2000 school year fourth graders were given the opportunity to participate in the WordMasters Challenge. The children prepared for the contest by meeting weekly with the Elementary Learning Enrichment Teacher,

Mrs. Orlosky. During these practice meetings, the children were given lists of challenging vocabulary words to study. They were encouraged to master the meanings of the words and to think about relationships between them.

The contest itself consists of three 20-minute analogy-solving meets. This year the meets were held in December, February, and April. Math: The student must participate in the PACE program; consideration is given to both aptitude and achievement test scores; classroom performance will be evaluated; outcomes of any appropriate contests will be considered

Art: The selected student must display good citizenship and class participation; have a positive effect on peers; exhibit high level of creativity, and demonstrate a significant level of improvement/achievement.

Foreign Language: The student selected as the academic best in this category must achieve at a 95% level in each of three quarters, demon-

strate excellent class participation and a positive classroom attitude, and demonstrate classroom leadership and reliability.

Music: Participation in at least one ensemble is required for this award, along with superior grades in general music class; the student must possess leadership, responsibility, a positive attitude and dependability.

English: The student representing the academic "best" in this category must demonstrate scholarship, leadership, a positive attitude, class participation, responsibility, accountability, dependability, and initiative.

Physical Education: The student selected in this category must display a positive attitude toward physical education; participate to the best of ability in all activities at all times; score, at the least, the average requirement on the National Physical Fitness Test for fitness; maintain a sense of game; and demonstrate responsible, respectful behavior as a team player.

Academic Growth: The student selected in this category has demonstrated outstanding commitment and growth.





#### Disaster Relief Service




Seth Price earned the distinction of having collected the most money for the Red

#### 2000 Summer Institute for the Gifted




Congratulations to Rachel Mall, who was chosen to attend the 2000 Summer Institute for the Gifted, a threeweek academic summer camp for

### **Science Fair**

In the 1999-2000 season, he broke the school single season record for assists. In track and field, Ryan was named MVP as he broke school records in both the 1600 and 3200 meter events.
