Westmont Runs Roughshod Over Dale

Before a crowd of two thousand people, last Friday, Westmont U. Y. outclassed Dale to win a decisive victory, 46-0. Westmont U. Y. was not forced to punt once, for every time a first down was needed the lads were there to furnish it. Every man of the twenty-two Varsity squad did his share in contributing towards the winning of this game. The total number of yards gained in this game by Westmont were 517, compared to Dale's 40. The tackling by both teams during the first half was both clean and hard.

The probable line-up for Westmont includes Marshall, Wilner, Foy and Peel in the back field, with Ellis and Kaminsky at the wing posts, Man and Wendroth at the tackles, Abe and Zimmerman at the guard positions with Farr rounding out the line at the center spot.
