#### In Panel Discussion

At the Hi-Y Church Service held recently at the Franklin Street M. E. Church, William Stattler, president of the W.-U. Y. Hi-Y and the Senior Hi-Y-Council, lead one of four panel discussions,

"What to consider in choosing friends." "Bill" gave an interesting and thorough discussion on this topic. Approximately three hundred persons were present to hear these informal talks.

Other subjects of interest were: "Why go to college under present conditions," "How will the national debt be paid," and "Is religion as vital today as it was in the past." These were discussed by various Hi-Y presidents; Jackie Murdock, of Johnstown Central Hi-Y; Jack Hess, of Ferndale Hi-Y; and Bob Leitenberger, of Southmont Hi-Y. All discussions were lead by Rev. Dr. W. K. Anderson.

The service was opened with a trumpet solo by Wade Ackley and closed with a hymn sung by the Westmont Hi-Y quartet, consisting of Eddie Smith, Bill Schneek, Dick Tomb, and Wade Ackley.

In order to increase its funds the Yodler staff will hold a rummage sale on Saturday, March 23, in a building on Franklin Street near Main Street.

### MASTER OF EDUCATION DEGREE EARNED BY MR. TOMB

Mr. Tomb, teacher of histories in our high school, completed a course in education and history, which gave him his Master of Education degree, in February.

No thesis was written, but sufficient work for thirty credits was accomplished. Ten tests, including an oral one were taken by Mr. Tomb before receiving his award.
