The U. U. Y. H. S. basketball team, downed 32--10 by Somerset, bounced back so hard last Friday night that Altoona, last year's league champions, were pushing to defeat W. U. Y. The lions conquered the vastly improved and rejuvenated Red and Gray team, 32--30.

The Enghmen made the first field goal and for the greater part of the first quarter kept pace with their opponents. At the half time due to a ragged second period, the score stood 19--9 in favor of Altoona. At the end of the third quarter the lions still led by a score of 27--19. In the remaining quarter, W. U. Y. steadily decreased their opponents' lead until they stood within two points of Altoona's score. With less than a minute to play the lions captured the ball and would not give it up. They kept it until the final gun sounded and kept Westmont from getting the coveted basket.

Johnny Grove, captain, was a leading factor in Westmont's improved play. He had the full support of a team that worked together. When Grove went out on personal fouls near the end, Dean Engh capable filled his place.

GYMNASTIC CLUBS TO GIVE

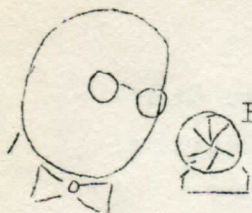
EXHIBITION IN SPRING
