Questionable traits may amuse and satisfy temporarily, but adult society has no worth while place for an individual who is not dependable and who can not be held responsible for all his acts.

It is evident that the best preparation the student can get in high school is the result of the individual's effort. All along the line there may be error, disappointment, even suffering. But at all times we can be sure that everything we do counts in the shaping of our lives. We need to distinguish between right and wrong and choose to do the right.

As our graduates launch forth into the more difficult work of adult life they will appreciate the importance of good scholarship and guidance in the many things that make life worth while.

May 29—Well, skools almost over, but i didnt graduate, so ile see yu neckst yere—I hope, i hope, i hope, i hope.

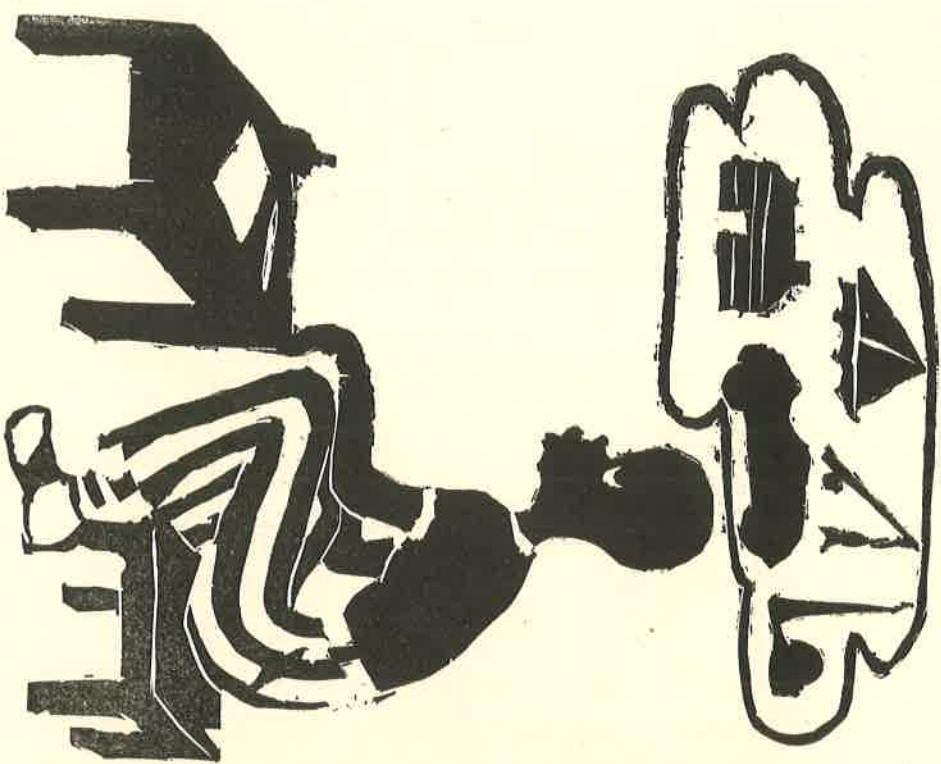

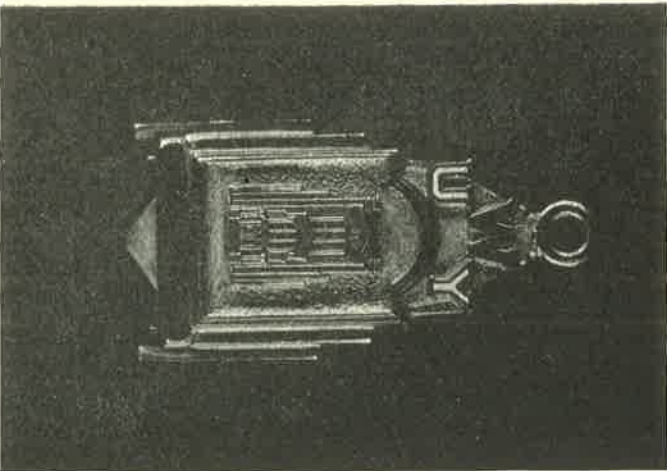

## Hilltoppers Take Third Place In Pitt Meet

Westmont-Upper Yoder's track and field squad won third place in the class B section of the tenth annual Johnstown Junior Pitt college track meet. Competing in class B which included all schools under 800 enrollment, the hilltoppers captured one first place, three seconds and two third places to finish behind Georges and Derry Townships.

Tom Depp captured the discus throw for W-U. Y. with a heave of 121 feet, two and one-half inches, breaking the former record of 104 feet, four and one-half inches. This was one of the several records broken that afternoon.

In the mile relay Joe Evans, "Mac" McCleary, Jack Davis, and "Frey" Reed turned in a third place to round out W-U. Y.'s performances in the track events.

In the field events "Mac" McCauliff tossed the shot put 41 feet, eight inches to take second place, while "Bull" McCleary whipped the javelin 149 feet, seven inches to hold down third place.

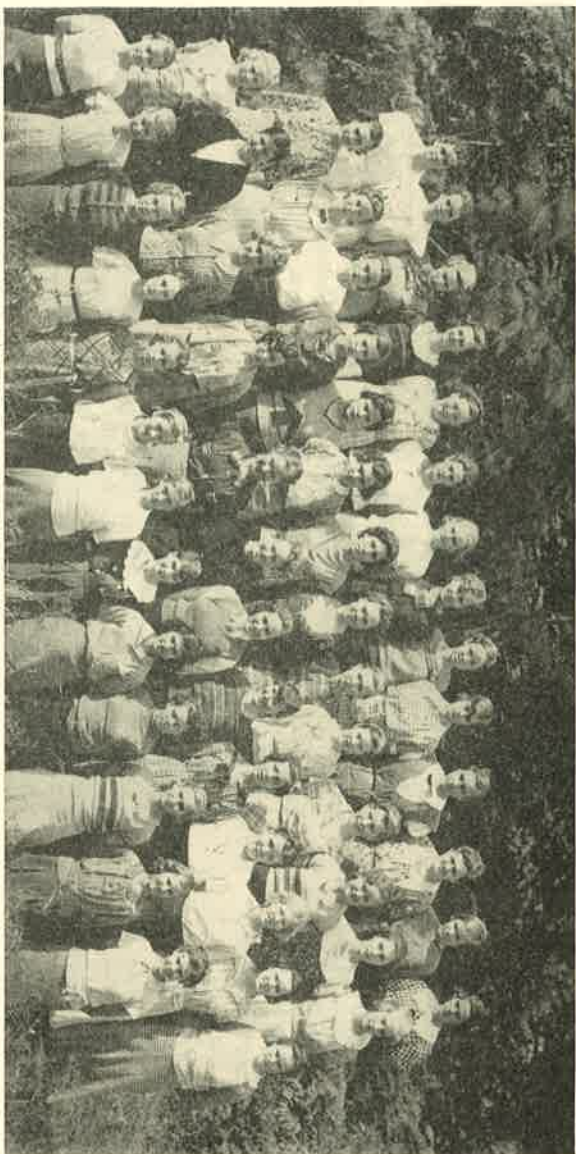

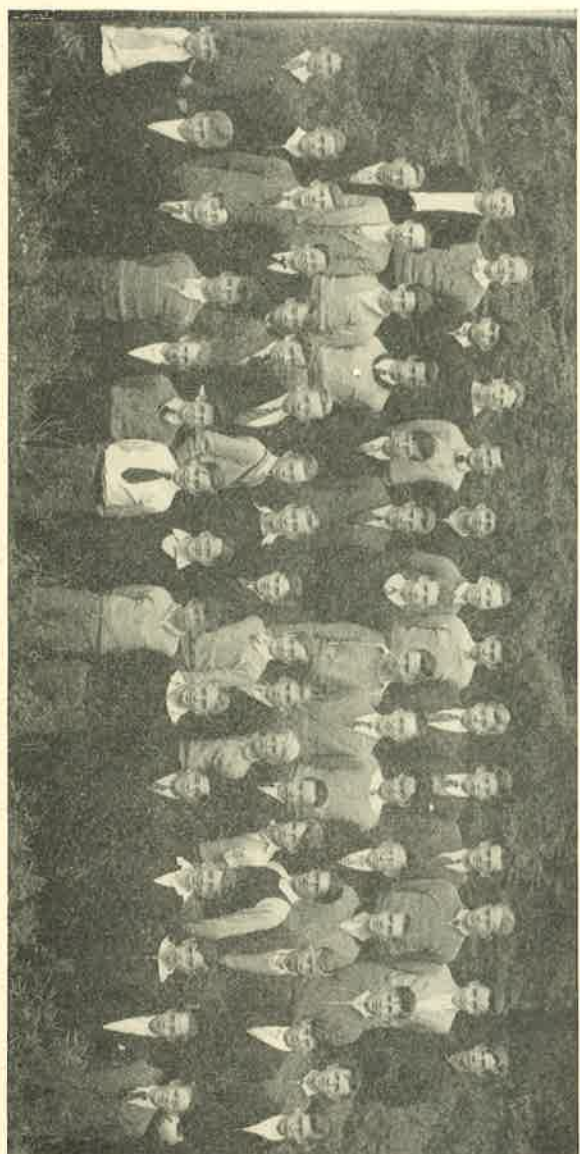
