NEW TEACHERS INTERVIEWED

At the start of this new school year, we are glad to welcome four new faculty members to our "haven of learning." By this time you know: Miss Gerhardt, Mrs. Sheehe, Mrs. Grandinetti, and Mr. Askey. We know their names, but here are some new details.

Miss Gerhardt, who teaches American history, Civics, and P. O. D., was born in Greenville, Pa., but moved to Johnstown at the age of two. She attended the Johnstown Public Schools, graduated from Johnstown High, and went to Thiel College in Greenville from which she was graduated with a B. A. degree. For the past six years she has lived in Westmont. Previous to this year she taught at Richland. For the last few summers she has been a counselor at the Blue Knob (Y. W. C. A.) Camp, where she was instructor of swimming and handicrafts. She will direct the Senior Play this year. Her favorite song is "As Time Goes By." She loves spaghetti and collecting antiques.

World history, art, and mechanical drawing are being taught this year by the talented Mrs. Sheehee. She was born and reared in Johnstown; she attended Catholic High School before going to Indiana State Teachers' College where she was graduated with a B. S. degree. After graduating she supervised art for five years at the East Conemaugh High School, and Grade School. Her hobbies are collecting antiques, dress designing, swimming, playing bridge, and painting. She is a member of the Allied Artists, an art club in Johnstown. She likes to read and listen to music in her spare time. "With all those hobbies, Mrs. Sheehe, when do you have any spare time?"

Mrs. Grandinetti, or Mary Ann, as she likes to be called, is our new Music Director. She is a native of Johnstown; after graduating from Johnstown High School, she attended Lebanon Valley College and Engle Conservatory of Music, where she received her B. A., and B. S. degrees. 
blocking.



Charles Dell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Dell, was killed the 8th of June, 1944 in Normandy, France. He attended Westmont-Upper Yoder High School until November 2nd, 1942 when he transferred to Franklin High School. His training consisted of engineering and clerical work.

From a fox-hole "Somewhere in France" one of his friends writes, as it rains, "Chuck is buried in France on a hill for which we fought. He is not alone though because one of his closest friends is beside him. I cannot say more now.

Another buddy from basic training days Washington writes from the Aleutians, Among us we have much slang, such as 'He's a good Joe' or 'He's in,' if we like a person and he is a regular fellow. This all adds up to tell us that Chuckie "was in.

JAMES E. OGLE

Lt. James E. Ogle, twenty-six, son of the late Earl Ogle, attorney, and Mrs. Ogle, Westmont, was accidentally killed July 16th, 1944 while serving with the Navy. He was graduated from Westmont-Upper Yoder High School in 1936 and took part in many of the

activities of the school.

In his four years at Westmont, Lt. Ogle was a member of the Biology Club, the Yodler staff, the Phoenician staff and in his senior year was representative to the Student Council. He also took part in the senior play and the operetta of 1936.
