## THREE W-U. Y. SENIORS WINS SCHOLARSHIPS

### Leuin, Mapoles, and Scott Chosen

"Study does pay." How many times have we all heard those words from the lips of our teachers and aunts. Some of us may have had our doubts but now we have been shown. Three senior boys of our school have received scholarships to various colleges. Irv Leuin, Norm Scott, and Jack Mapoles have definitely been accepted by the schools they wish to attend. Irv got an appointive state scholarship through Sen. John J. Haluska. Norm (who served a hitch in the navy, and was honorably discharged) was eligible under the G. I. Bill of Rights to at least 18 months free education. Both Irv and Norm left school at mid-semester to go to the Johnstown Center of the University of Pittsburgh. Incidentally, both of these boys have chosen the field of Medicine for their professions. The third of the trio, Jack Mapoles, received an offer of a scholarship to the University of Cornell. Jack will probably leave in June for Ithaca to study engineering.

Many scholarships are offered and are obtained in many different ways. These are state scholarships which are good in any of the state supported schools at Pitt or Penn State or University of Pennsylvania or Temple. These scholarships are usually won on competitive examination and personal interview and worth \$1,000 or the equivalent of four years' tuition. Then there are scholarships offered by the colleges themselves. These vary greatly in amount—anywhere from \$200 to \$2,400 and are obtainable in any number of ways. (Through competitive examination, through interview, through College Board Examinations, or athletic scholarships, to mention a few.)

Up to that time we had won seven of our first eight games, losing only to Johnstown 20-26. After Bill and Bob left we hit a slump due to the fact that their subs were inexperienced and quite naturally, the new combination weren't used to working together. After losing to Johnstown for the second time 19-13, we pulled ourselves up by the bootstraps to upset Indiana 33-31 in a game that was thrilling down to the final second.

Things are looking up for next year. We have three varsity veterans in Weiss, Johns, and Davis that are coming back; and all of the Tri-County Champion Junior Varsity are returning with the exception of Gene Kauffman. Other promising prospects are John Hipp and Herb Sherer from the Junior High team (which was undefeated in twelve games) who gave good accounts of themselves in the last Junior Varsity game in which they appeared. ## JUKE BOX

In this and forthcoming issues the Juke Box column has decided to present two of the bands best liked by the student body and, in our opinion, their best hot, swing, and sweet platters. This month the column humbly dedicates itself to the "Sentimental Gentleman of the Slush Pump," Tommy Dorsey, and to the "King of the Licorice Stick," Benny Goodman.

Tommy Dorsey undoubtedly attained his present status at the top of the popularity bracket through his unique arrangements and the fine solos rendered by himself and other noted members of his band. Many stars have emerged from under the maestro's baton to seek their own, among them are Frank Sinatra, the Pied Pipers, and Jo Stafford. Dorsey has produced the "Starmaker" and the "Sentimental" albums as well as many other fine VICTOR records, a few of which are classified below.

HOT—"Swing High," featuring Z. Elman, is a nightmare of drum breaks, clarinet and sax rides, and Ziggy's indomitable trumpeting. "Well Git It" is another fine hot T. D. disc.

SWING—"Swanee River" is typical of Dorsey's broken tempo in the first chorus, the trumpets prevailing over an impressive lilting background. Later, the song is featured by trombone, trumpet, and sax solos by Tommy, Pee Wee Irwin, and Bud Freeman. "Why" by T. D. is also highly recommended.

SWEET—Tommy's slip-horn introduces the first chorus of "I Dream of You" with a tender phrasing of the melody. A fine vocal is supplied by Freddie Stewart.

Benny Goodman, like T. D., is also noted for putting in lights the names of members of his many trios, sextets, quartets, and full orchestra. Among the most noted are Harry James, Count Basie, Gene Krupa, and Lionel Hampton. Benny's sextet has recorded four of their best records for the COLUMBIA album, "Benny Goodman's Sextet." Others of the King of Swing's records are:

HOT—"Sing, Sing, Sing" features Krupa at the drums on a VICTOR double-faced version of an old jazz classic. "After You've Gone" on COLUMBIA is a semi-hot oldie spotted with numerous solos.

SWING—"Let's Dance," Benny's theme, is a tune built for the jitterbugs who like their music of a medium tempo, not too fast or slow. Backing this platter, Chris Griffin does a fine job on a sweet jazz solo, "Boy Meets Horn." Chris's solo is our sweet song for Benny.

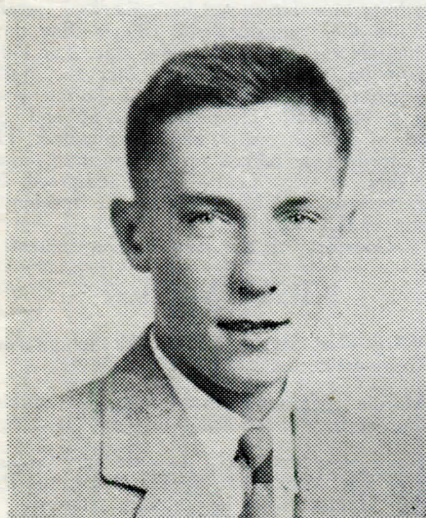

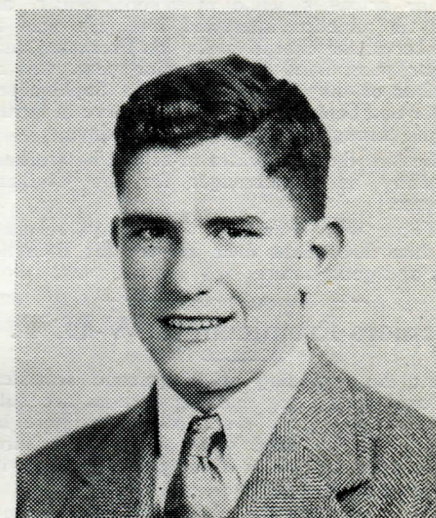
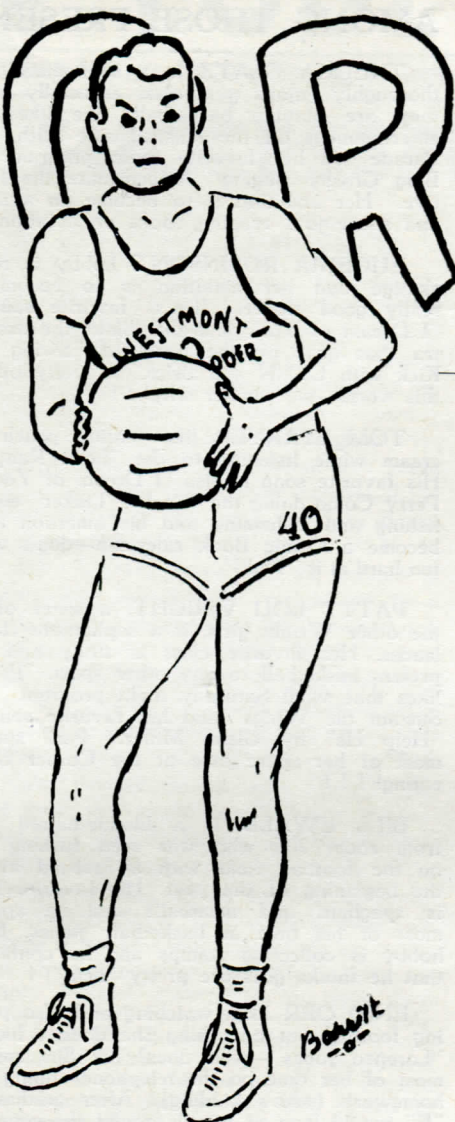

## Tri-County Rules Explained

This article is aimed at revealing the lesser known facts about the Tri-County League. As most of you students know the League is made up of six teams: Johnstown, Ferndale, Westmont, Indiana, Windber, and Ebensburg. The entire Tri-County League schedule is set up at a Spring meeting by the schedule committee. The eligibility rules are by the P. I. A. A., but there are no regulations as to enrollments, that is why a school as large as Johnstown is in competition. Different schools are elected to offices and the main representative of the school fills the office for the term. The officers, as elected for this year are: President, Windber High School; Vice-President, Johnstown High School, and Secretary-treasurer, Westmont-Upper Yoder High school. If a school drops out of the league, a new school can take its place only by the unanimous consent of all members of the league. The constitution and by-laws of Tri-County take care of any disputes or arguments which should arise. Before the season starts the officials who will take care of the various games on the schedule are elected. Every school involved in competition must approve of them before they can officiate. At the end of the season, if two teams are tied for first place, the playoff game has to be played on a neutral floor. The winner receives a trophy or plaque which has been bought by the league from its funds. Thus, you have a thumb-nail sketch of how the Tri-County League operates.

## GIRLS' BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT WON BY JUNIORS
