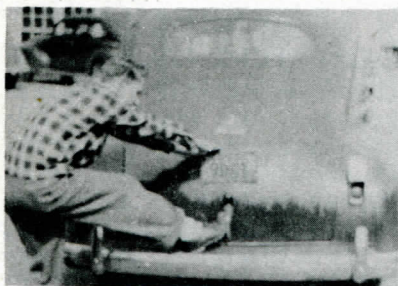
The Senior Class

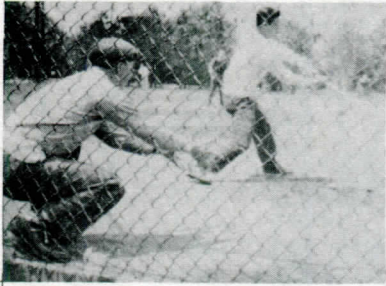
ASSEMBLY ON MAY 14th.

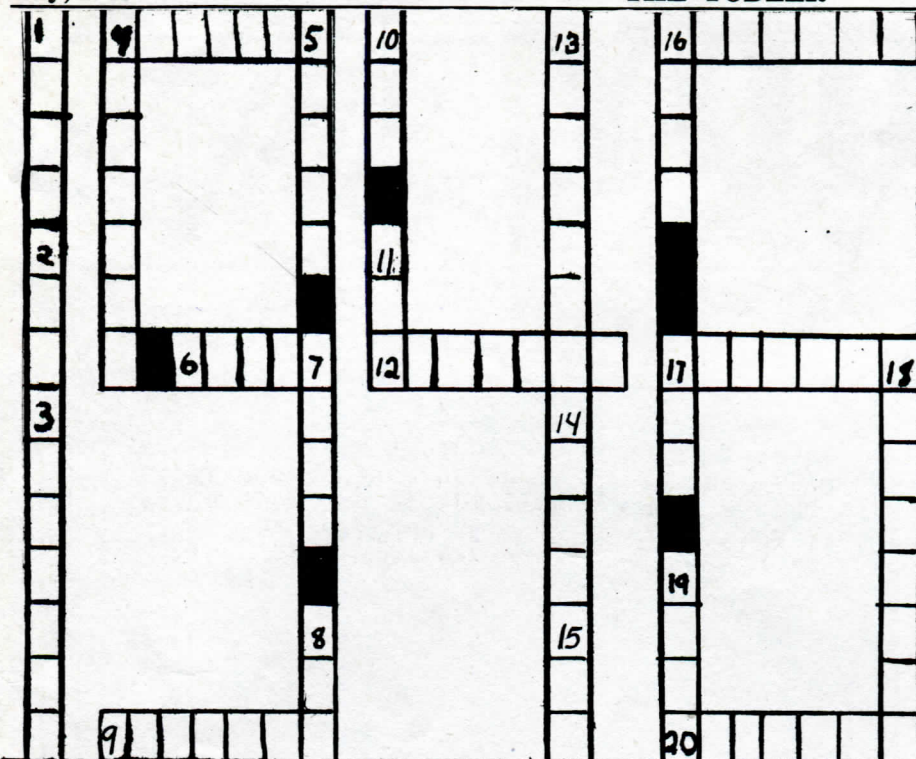
