BACCALAUREATE SERVICES SCHEDULED FOR MAY 23

For the first time in the history of W.-U. Y. baccalaureate services will be conducted jointly with another school. Southmont and Westmont will combine for the occasion on May twenty-third. A memorable program is being planned.

Graduation exercises for the Westmont-Upper Yoder Class of '48 will take place in our high school auditorium on May twenty-fourth. Rev. Allen Stockdale, who is very much interested in young people's affairs, will be the principal speaker of the evening. This informative as well as entertaining speaker was obtained through the help of the National Association of Manufacturers. The graduating class consists of seventy-four members. Every year fifteen percent of the entire class is eligible for membership in the National Honor Society. BOYS' W-CLUB

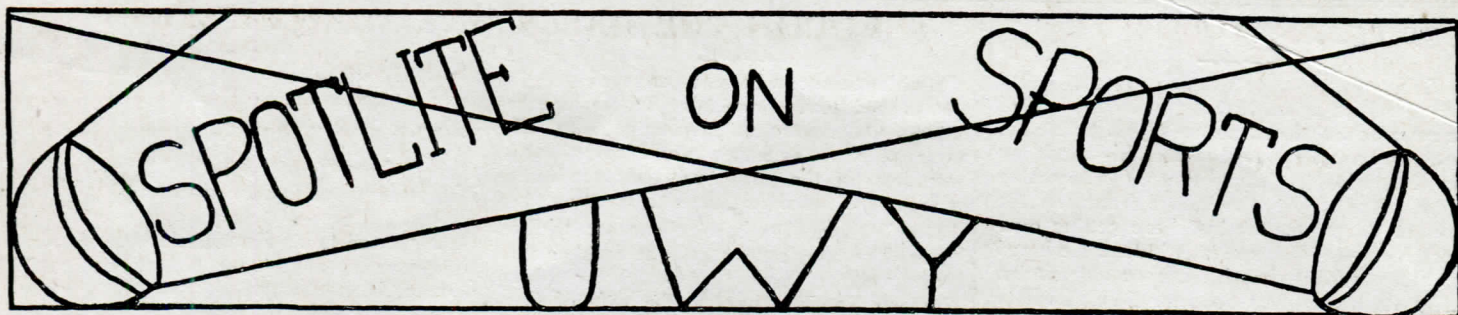
