

FROM OTHER PLACES.

Two Southern Towns Aid the Johnstown Sufferers.

PROVO AND LEHI'S GOOD WORK.

Salt Lake's Good Example Emulated With Good Results—Fraternal Acts of a Good People.

A mass meeting of the citizens was held in the district court room at Provo on Monday night at 8 o'clock, pursuant to a call by President Dusenberry, of the chamber of commerce.

The meeting was called to order, and W. H. Dusenberry, elected chairman, and H. Backman, Jr., the secretary of the chamber of commerce, secretary. Over fifty of the most prominent business men of Provo were present.

The chairman stated the object of the meeting, which had been called to consider the terrible calamity that had come upon the people of the Conemaugh valley, in Pennsylvania, and also of Seattle, in Washington territory, with a view to aiding the sufferers. He said he had been in communication with Secretary Hollister, of the Salt Lake chamber of commerce, and learned it was the intention there to divide the means raised between Seattle and Johnstown, and suggested that we follow the same course that had been pursued in Salt Lake city.

H. S. Hines favored the idea, but in the meantime thought we ought to do something immediately. W. H. Brown moved that a committee of twenty, to consist of five from each ward, be appointed to report to this meeting, not later than Wednesday night. S. S. Jones, Rev. Mr. Goodell, John E. Booth, George Sutherland, Rev. Mr. Jeffreys, and a number of others spoke on the question, mostly favoring immediate action for the relief of Seattle sufferers, and then a general subscription to be divided between the two places.

David Evans moved to amend the motion before the house, so that the general committee of eleven be appointed, with Mayor Dusenberry as chairman. The motion as amended was adopted unanimously.

David Evans then nominated the bishops of each ward, together with the pastors of the Congregational and the Methodist churches. These names were put to vote, each separately, and the following committee was elected. It was recommended that Bishop Booth would be away, and Mr. Evans substituted the name of H. H. Cluff. The names of the committee are: J. P. R. Johnson, Evan Weide, Myron Tanner, H. H. Cluff, Rev. Mr. Jeffreys, Rev. Mr. Goodell, S. S. Jones, R. S. Hines, J. P. McChellen, J. C. Graham and C. W. Hemenway, with W. H. Dusenberry chairman.

It was generally understood that the committee appointed will arrange for an entertainment to be given in the theatre at an early date, and to otherwise collect such means as the people desire to give.

S. S. Jones was elected treasurer. On motion being made, the subscriptions were opened at once, and nearly every man present gave in his name for from one to twenty dollars each, to be ready to forward to Seattle within twenty-four hours—a large portion was paid in to the treasurer at once.

When the meeting adjourned, Chairman Dusenberry requested the committee just appointed, and also the committee on the Fourth of July that had been chosen last week, to remain a few minutes for consultation. Provo may be a very wicked place, but we have many good, generous people here.

Lehi to the Front.

In pursuance of the governor's proclamation and the sympathy of the people of Lehi, at a mass meeting, held at the court house on Friday, June 7th, a committee of three was appointed as follows: Bishop T. R. Cutler, Postmaster James Harwood and Band Leader A. M. Fox. The work of the committee was to devise a way of realizing aid for the sufferers by the late flood in Pennsylvania. The deliberations of the committee, and the necessity for immediate action, resulted in the adoption of the plan for a sacred concert to be given in the Lehi tabernacle, Sunday evening, June 9th, at 8 p. m., to be participated in by the Lehi choir, the brass and string bands and our amateur vocalists; also appropriate speeches, etc.

The hour and day named found the house crowded, and after the usual preliminaries, John Woodhouse read the story of the flood as gleaned from the various papers.

Miss Laura Webb and Miss Bell Gibb favored the audience with a duet, which was highly appreciated.

George Webb followed, showing the weakness of man when the elements combine. Then came a song by Miss Cutler, a selection by the choir and remarks by Edwin Evans.

Bishop Cutler said that he presumed the people were now ready to manifest their sympathy by their works, and announced that hats would be sent around to receive from those who were now prepared to give, and that to-morrow at Mr. Harwood's place of business further donations in all kinds of produce, would be received.

While the hats were being passed around an organ solo was played by Miss Hannah Pickle. Next, a song by Miss Laura Webb; remarks by A. H. Anderson, singing by the choir; remarks by Thomas Fowler, on the present position of the sufferers in comparison with ourselves; next, a duet by Miss Katie Woodhouse and Miss Lena Anderson.

Bishop Cutler arose and thanked the people for their response to the calls of humanity, and also drew a comparison between the horrors of war and an occurrence like this, this seeming worse even than war, as women and children were included with the sufferers as well as men, while the destruction of property was appalling and all seemed to make such scenes as this worse even than war.

Condolence for the dead and sympathy for the living were ably expressed by all the speakers, and according to the circumstances of those present, aid was given.

The subscription will be open throughout the day to enable the children and others to add their mite in produce, butter, eggs, etc., when the means realized will be sent to L. S. Hills, Desert National bank, as treasurer for the relief fund.

The meeting was dismissed by benediction by the chaplain.

It is hoped, for the credit of the community, that there will not be one person who has not responded to this call, aside from the contributions presented at the mass meeting.—S. Arnold.

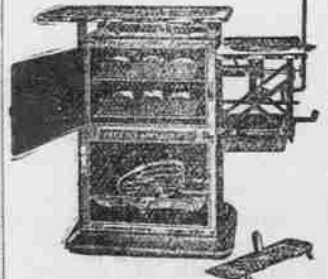

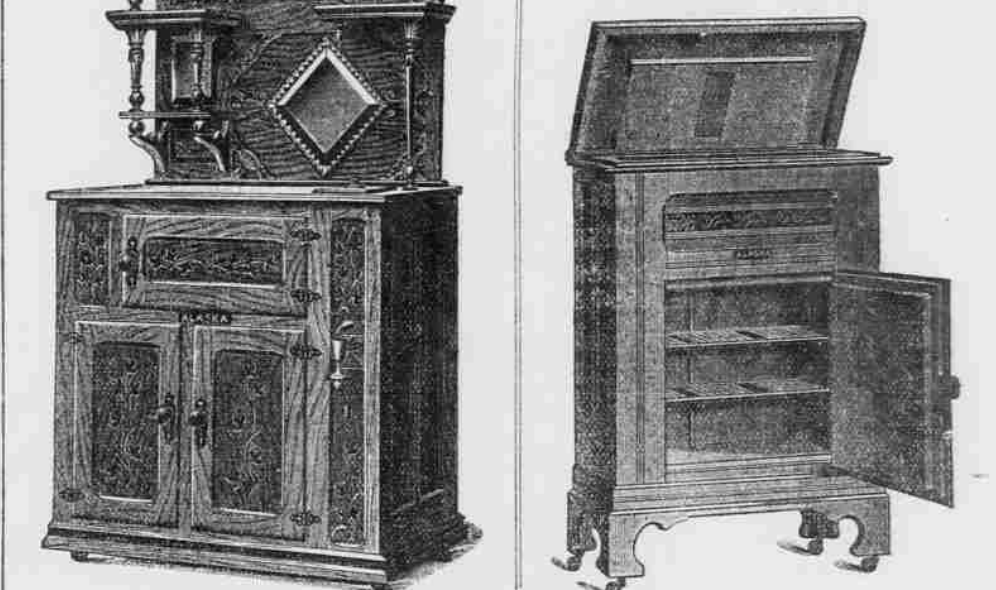
