How the Idaho Town Progresses and Prospers.

THE IDARO CANAL COMPANY

In Which Several Salt Lovers are Interested -The Eagle Rock Water Company -The Good Work Done.

EAGLE ROCK, Idaho, July 3, 1890. -[Special correspondence of THE HERALD.] -On the bank of the Snake river -the largest stream in Idaho -fifty miles north of Pocatello and on the line of the Utah & North-western branch of the Union Pacific railway, is situated Eagle Rock, and a more suitable and perfect location for a townsite could not have been selected in all the surrounding country than this. Since its organization it has prospered, and to-day it is known as one of the great towns of the territory. The citizens are wide awake and enterprising, leaving nothing undone that may redound to their interests. Many acres of land, which with water would yield ample returns, are surrounding this place, a barren waste, but soon to come to bloom and fruition. On the 16th of September, 1889, was organized the Idaho Canal company, with a capital stock of \$500,000, its purpose being to bring a supply of water to irrigate the land. The officers of this company are: L. E. Hall, president, Salt Lake City; J. A. Clark, engineer and secretary, Eagle Rock; W. W. Post, treasurer, Salt Lake; and C. C. Taintphans, superintendent of construction. Immediately after the organization of the company work was commenced on the canal by the contractors at a point some twelve miles from Eagle Rock, where the water will be taken from Snake river. The estimated cost of building this canal is \$75,000, and it is proposed to irrigate 100,000 acres of land with this one canal. The canal will be forty feet wide at the bottom, with a grade of two feet to the mile. It has been completed already to within a mile from town, and it is an assured fact that the approach of fall will see all the work completed. The headgates will be constructed of solid rock laid on cement with a foundation, and will have a clear space of fifty-six feet for water at the rate, and at a low stage carry five feet pressure. The Eagle Rock and Willow Creek Water company is another ditch company which has a paid-up capital of \$100,000, and has its canal now in operation irrigating over forty thousand acres of land now under cultivation. The water is carried twenty-five miles over the country, and has made paying farms of what had been barren deserts. The Eagle Rock Water company has several miles of iron pipes carrying water over the entire town, and its service has given unbounded satisfaction. This company has been in existence since the fall of 1885, and since then have made many improvements in the system. Seven fire plugs, for the protection of the town, were put in, and the Eagle Hose company organized with W. W. Keefer, a veteran Pennsylvanian fireman, as chief, and so well has this town been protected that there has never been a single dollar sacrificed to the flames. The company have a valuable hose carriage, carrying 600 feet of 2 1/2-inch hose and is composed of twenty-five of the most active men of the town. Last fall Messrs. Burgess & Edelman, two enterprising citizens of Eagle Rock, constructed a flour mill, with a capacity of fifty barrels a day, and the only first class roller mill machinery. They use only the product of this section, but so far, have been unable to handle all the grain offered them and raised in this section. The Eagle Rock Register, edited by W. E. Wheeler, is one of the leading lights in Idaho journalism, and is authority on all questions appertaining to Bingham county in particular, and Idaho in general. The Democrats of this section being desirous of having an organ of their party in this section, organized a stock company for the publication of the same, which will be issued from here in a few days under the management of Bonney & Dennis, two staunch Democrats.
