DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The former Nathan's Department Store at 426-532 Main Street in Johnstown, PA, was constructed in 1917 and is four stories tall with a finished basement. Overall dimensions are: front-80'+ & Height - 70'+ and the area per floor is 10.550 sq. ft. In recent years the ground floor has been used as retail space and the remaining floors have been used as warehouse storage areas. Location of the building is across from Johnstown's Central Park in the commercial center of the city. (The building has been vacant since the July, 1977, flood.) Construction of the building is as follows: glazed architectural terra-cotta in a simplified classical motif along Main Street and portions of the side alley, concrete foundations, brick exterior walls at side and rear alleys and a composition flat roof. Interior construction consists of 21 equal structural bays of 26'-6"+ x 18'-9"+ of steel columns and beams with wood joists and maple floors. The exterior integrity has not, been disturbed with the exception of the ground floor retail area which apparently has been renovated various times through the life of the building. The exterior terra-cotta decoraion on Main Street along with the original wooden windows on the upper floors appear to be in an extremely good state of repair. A majority of the windows along the side and rear alleys have been blocked shut with brick construction through the years. The open interior structural bays are all intact and overall, the interior is intact with the exception of the ground floor which was damaged in the July 1977, flood. A tribute to the solidity of the structure is that in recent years the upper floors have been used as a furniture warehouse. The stairways and elevator are in the locations as originally constructed.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Constructed in 1917, this building housed one of Johnstown's important department stores in the decade that followed World War I.

In the late 1920's, management attempted an image change from a low-priced, general merchandisc department store, catering to framers, miners and steelworkers, to a higher-priced, carriage trade unit. Unfortunately the operation could not withstand the pressures of cultivating new customers, combined with the impact of depression, and it went out of business.


- The site was subsequently leased to S.S. Kresge, which operated a fairly good variety store for many years.
- More recently, Kresge transformed the unit to a Jupiter, which survived until the flood on July 20, 1977.
- This building has been a significant retail location in Johnstown through World War I, the 1929 crash, the great depression, the Johnstown Flood of 1936, a prolonged steel strike in 1937, World War II, and the disastrous 1977 flood.
- In center city, facing Johnstown's picturesque Central Park, this building deserves to be preserved, restored and put back into a state of economic usefulness.

The architectural significance of the former Nathan's Department Store constructed in 1917, is that it is one of the few remaining examples of glazed architectural terra-cotta work on a large scale in the Johnstown Area. Of importance is the source of the architectural motif - a simplified classical style using an incised pilaster relief with derivations from the 19th centrury commercial architecture of Chicago (as manifested in the Reliance Building, 1890 to 1985, by John W. Root and the Schlesinger and Meyer Dept. Store (now Carson, Pirie, Scott and Company), 1899 to 1904 by Louis Sullivan. The similiarities are evident in the use of the "Chicago Window" (division of the various window areas into 3 main parts by mullions), the glazed architectural terra-cotta on the Main Street Elevation, and the open structural bays framed in metal. The relationship to the proto-modern commercial/skyscraper style of Louis Sullivan (and later Frank Lloyd Wright) are apparent in teh simplification of the classical elements resulting in an extremely bold and sure design.
