

Joining the All-American Hockey League as the Commissioner for 1987-88 is Brendon Watson. For the past four years, he was one of the top on-ice officials in the Atlantic Coast Hockey League and his career in professional hockey dates back to the Southern Hockey League and the days of the Winston-Salem Polar Twins and the Greensboro Generals.

Mr. Watson is beginning his twenty-third year as a professional hockey official. In addition to the ACHL and the SHL, Brendon has also served as a referee and linesman in the American Hockey League, Central Hockey League, Eastern Hockey League, and the North American Hockey League. He was also an on-ice official in the World Hockey Association skating along side the likes of Gordie Howe, Bobby Hull, Wayne Gretzky, Derek Sanderson, and Rick Dudley. REFEREE SIGNALS



ICING

Arms folded across chest.



INTERFERENCE

Crossed arms stationary in front of chest.



SLOW WHISTLE

Either arm, in which whistle is held, extended above head. If play returns to Neutral Zone without stoppage, arm is drawn down the instant puck crosses the line.



ELBOWING

Tapping either elbow with the opposite hand.



CHARGING

Rotating clenched fist around one another in front of body.



CROSS-CHECKING

A series of forward and backward motions with both fists clenched extending from chest,



MISCONDUCT

Placing both hands on hips several times and pointing to penalized player.



SLASHING

A series of chopping motions with the edge of one hand across the opposite forearm.



TRIPPING

Extending right leg forward, clear of the ice, and striking it with right hand below the knee.



HOLDING

Clasping either wrist with the other hand well in front of chest.



HIGH-STICKING

Holding both fists, Clenched, one immediately above the other, at the height of the forehead.



HOOKING

A series of tugging motions with both arms, as if pulling something toward the stomach.



DELAYED CALL-

Referee repeatedly points, with free hand (without whistle) to player to be penalized until play is stopped.



WASHOUT

Both arms swung laterally across the body with palms down.


1. When used by the Referee it means goal disallowed.

2. When used by Linesmen it means there is no icing or no off-side.

ICING AND OFFSIDE

ICING

- A lcing does not occur when a player shoots the puck from the offensive zone of the center ice into the opposition's end of the rink.
- B lcing is called when a player shoots the puck from his own—or defensive—zone across the opponent's goal line (but not through the goal crease). Icing is not called when a team is short-handed; when a player could have touched puck before it went across goal line; when a player from icing teams touches puck first.




OFFSIDE PASS

- C An offside pass occurs when a member of the attacking team passes the puck from behind his own blue line to a teammate across the center red line.
- D An attacking player may pass the puck over the center red line and the blue line to a teammate, as long as the teammate does not cross the blue line before the puck.

E OFFSIDE

A team is offside when a player crosses the blue line before the puck. The determining factor in an offside is the position of the skates; they must both be over the line ahead of the puck to be considered offside.



OFFSIDE PASS

Watch Out for Flying Pucks

A flying puck can do a great deal of damage, so it is important that hockey fans be alert. Building and hockey club management is not responsible for spectator injuries.
